HARRISON THE SHELF. HARRISON'S CHINESE RECORD.

Ben Harrison is a candidate for is stated in his letter of acceptance: "The laws relating to this subject would, if I should be charged with their enforcement, be faithfully executed. Such amendments or further legislation as may be necessary to prevent evasions of the laws and to stop further Chinese immigra-tion would also meet my approval. The expression of the convention upon this subject is in entire harmony with my views." The convention expressed itself strongly

against Chinese immigration. General Harrison was once a sen ator in congress, and his votes on the proposition to resrict Chinese legislation are matter of record. It is a record which in a letter published during the Chicago conven-tion Senator Ingalls said would be awkward. A Chinese exclusion bill was under consideration in the senate and on March 8, 1882, Senator Harrison is recorded as voting aye the property of any person other than himself. On the next day amendment prohibiting the naturalization of Chinese. Senator Har-rison voted no. He voted no also on an amendment of an Oregon senator to make the term Chinese laborers include all Chinese whether skilled or unskilled. Through his pair, Senator Maxey, of Texas he voted for an amendment to change the term of exclusion from twenty

to ten years.

The bill for exclusion of Chinese immigrants was passed March 9. Senator Maxey for the bill announced his pair with Senator Harrison, who was against the bill. The bill was passed by a vote of 35 ayes to 15 noes, Senator Harrison absent, but paired, as has been stated, against the bill.

President Arthur interposed a veto, which was fully approved by Senator Harrison on high moral foreign relations. On the question of passing the bill over the president's veto Harrison voted no.

A few weeks later a new bill was before the senate to prohibit Chinese immigration for ten years. A motion to strike out the provision that Chinese shall not be admitted to citizenship was defeated. Senator Harrison voted for the motion. Senator Harrison is recorded as of American missionaries in China. He stood manfully to the doctrine question, when he declared:

question, when he declared:

"I do not think that a large Chinese immigration to this country is desireable. I do not think it would be a valuable acquisition. On the contrary, I think it would be a seriously disturbing element. In race, civilization, habits, education, and religion the Chinese are widely different from our people—so different as to form a very striking contrast. The European immigrants are of the same race, religion, and civilization as ourselves, and while they add immensely to the power and wealth of the republic they do not seriously disturb the substantial homogeneity of our white population. Their immigration, therefore, benefits the country and deserves encouragement. Not so with the Chinese. They will never become one people with us. Were they to dwell here for centuries they would probably be as distinct from the white race as are Gypsies in Spain from the pure-blooded Spaniard."

As a candidate General Harrison personifies the awkwardness pre-dicted by Senator Ingalls. Without qualification, explanation or reserve, and without any reference to his senatorial record, Candidate Harrison now stands with Denis Kearney. Neither the sacredness of treaty obligations nor the safety of American missionaries gives him
