When filled, or so much grass or fooder is placed in it as desired, place tarred paper over the top and cover with earth to a depth of one foot or more. Be sure to put on sufficient dirt to exclude the air.

Mr. Stewart says the cost of building his silo, material and workmanship, did not exceed \$100. At such small cost every farmer can afford to build a silo. tude heard from at this office is that of Messrs. D. C. Stewart & Sons, near Forest Grove. Their silo is ten feet square at the base and twenty feet in height. Its capacity is estimated at eighty tons of cut grass or fodder. The product of nine acres of corn, estimated at thirty-five tons, was cut to one half inch in length and stored away in this silo. After remaining in the silo for about ninety days, the covering was removed. Mr. W. H. Morgan, merchant, Lake City, Fla., was taken with a severe cold, After remaining in the silo for about innety days, the covering was removed, and the ensilage found to be in excellent condition, excepting about eight inches in depth at the top, which was moldy and unfit for use. Mr. Stewart says his stock, with few exceptions, seemed to relish the new food, and ate it as if to this "manner" born.

We were informed by Mr. Stewart that when the silo is ready to open, the covering may be removed and exclusion of air is no longer necessary, at least he

and dairymen. The silo should be built high, so as to give greater pressure within its walls. As for instance: One ten feet square at the base should not be less than twenty feet in attitude. For one of this size, heavy studding should be used, placed not further than ten inches apart. After boarding up on the outside, rustic or ship-lap may be used on the inside. Ceil closely on the inside.
