GOOD ROADS.

The Popular Vote.

The whole number of votes cast in all the states in the election of November 6th, for president, was 11,285,825, of which Cleveland electors received 5,646,200, Harrison electors 5,566,702, all others 72,923. These figures may be varied by official returns, but will not be materially changed. It will thus be seen that Cleveland had a clear majority over all of 3,575, and a plurality over Harrison of 79,499.
