WHO IS IT?

A jury of twelve citizens of Yamhill county have rendered the verdict which cleared W. A. Howe of the charge preferred by Sappington. In the court room during the trial, there could be seen a poor little innocent babe with the brand of hasty written on it. THE TANNER COMPLICATIONS. In assigning his reasons for declining the pension commission, Major Warner has given a picturesque description of the wreck which has been made of the bureau under Tanner's administration. He truthfully says that no man can now take the place without making a martyr of himself, with the certainty of offending "the sensible, level-headed people of the country" if he follows in Tanner's footsteps, and an equal certainty of offending the G. A. R. men if he declines to do so.

The outlook for President Harrison in his effort to fill the place under such circumstances is not encouraging. But it is well to bear in mind the fact that the difficulty is simply the result of an attempt to make a corrupt and shameless misuse of public functions for purposes of personal ambition and partisan advantage.

Tanner was appointed for the sole purpose of winning the votes of the pension-seekers and the political support of the pension sharks. It was intended that he should commit precisely the offenses he had committed and pursue the course he had pursued in order that the republican party might gain support and Mr. Harrison increase his popularity.

It was an evil thing, a dishonest thing, to make an appointment for such a purpose; but it was not Tanner who did it, but President Harrison in pursuit of the deliberately adopted surbursting policy of his party. Tanner blundered in doing the job and talked so much that a scandal arose. His sole offense was in getting found out.

The matter is one about which plain truth should be spoken, and this is plain truth.

THE BRITISH NAVY.

The late series of British naval maneuvers, if it had been anything else, has pretty clearly demonstrated that England's boasted naval strength is in part a sham of a very modifying description. The official report of the maneuvers was prepared by four admirals, commanding the several squadrons, and if it had any bias at all would naturally be in favor of the ships rather than otherwise. It is strikingly significant, therefore, that some of the criticisms reveal alarming features of inefficiency. In the first place, the much-vaunted torpedo boats are condemned as practically worthless except for distinctly coast and harbor uses. Then the target gun clads, particularly the more modern ones, were hithered during the maneuvers by grave defects of machinery. Very few of them succeeded in actually maintaining the speed at which they were nominally rated. The Rupert reached eight knots with difficulty. Another failed to do even as well as that and fell behind the fleet. The Shannon made a shabby nine knots only. The huge Inflexible, not many years ago the most formidable war-ship which Britain owned, was temporarily disabled because of the breaking down of a portion of her machinery. Three of the armor-clad monitors, whose tonnage was hardly managed to steam regularly ten. The same story is to be told of the "fast" cruisers. The Mersey, a ship intended as a match for some of our new vessels and supposed to be able to run along at the rate of fourteen and a half for a while and then slowed down to overhaul her boilers. The Mohawk and her sister ships also had trouble with the tubes and boilers and many of the smaller cruisers and gunboats were continually undergoing various processes of tinkering in a vain attempt to make them serviceable. Two ships, the Archer and Cossack, corresponding to our Yorktown, had to have new tubes fitted to their boilers before they had been three months in commission. Altogether, the experience of the new British vessels is something approximating actual service was a most dismal and disappointing one. It is certainly to be hoped that our

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THE MINORITY IN CONGRESS. The republican party with a bare majority in the house of representatives takes a very different view of the rights of a minority from what it held when the democrats had a majority.

In the last three congresses the republican minority in the house repeatedly prevented even the consideration of a bill to reduce the taxes. It resisted at every step measures for the good of the country which had been approved by the people in the general election, for no other apparent reason than that the adoption of such measures might benefit the democratic party. And it filibustered or broke a quorum whenever such proceedings were necessary to give effect to its caucus decrees.

But now that the situation is reversed the republican leaders propose to so change the rules of the house as to give them absolute control of legislation. And their organs denounce as "revolutionary" the democratic purpose to resist any such autocratic exercise of power. The democrats have no intention of acting as mere obstructionists. But they do not forget that the minority has duties as well as rights. They do not intend to consent to any change in the rules that will deprive them of their right to debate fully every measure brought before the house, nor that will prevent them from defeating by all constitutional and parliamentary means, legislation which they regard as dangerous or harmful to the country.

Upon the republican theory, the democratic representatives might about as well stay at home or have their dissenting votes registered by an automatic machine against any party measures which in this country the minority has some rights which the majority is bound to respect.--New York World.

The election in Washington is a decided victory for the republican party. Montana is a decided victory for the democratic party. The two Dakotas are republican as was expected.

In the seat of shooting Niagara the rubber suit seems likely to displace the barrel, but for great achievements in politics that excellent authority, Mr. Quay, holds that the barrel will always remain pre-eminent.

F. A. Carle, who for ten years was managing editor of the St. Paul Pioneer Press, will in a short time take a like position on the Oregonian at Portland. During the past year Mr. Carle has been the Washington correspondent of the Pioneer Press.

When the new editor of the Oregonian takes his seat, will the paper be as well edited as under Scott? We think not. Although Scott in his own writing shows a spirit and principle which is only concealed by evil spirits, he has made the Oregonian the leading paper of Oregon and one of the leading papers of the United States.

In the South statistics show that the states are prosperous in inverse ratio to the number of republicans they contain. Where republicans are most numerous the state is least prosperous. Where they are least numerous in proportion to population, the state is most prosperous. Witness Texas, Georgia and Tennessee, as compared with Virginia, South Carolina and Mississippi.

The sheriffs of the different eastern Oregon counties are planning a call for a sheriff's convention, the object of which is to organize and perfect plans to cooperate with one another for the detection and suppression of horse-thieves and other criminals. A similar organization exists in Iowa and is said to be far more effective than the present plan by which there is little co-operation among the sheriffs.

Forest fires have destroyed the "witness trees" that mark the boundary between Oregon and California by the survey made some fifteen years ago, thus obliterating all record of the same. The Jacksonville Times says that a party that recently took the contract for surveying five townships in Curry county was obliged to suspend operations as all traces of the state line had vanished. The folly of leaving nothing but trees to witness the established boundary between states would be inconceivable but for the fact that government surveyors closely resemble other officials in that they work mainly for the money that is in the job.

There is a secret organization in Portland, Me., the object of which is to bring its members from unfortunate marriages. When one of the club feels that he is falling in love he confuses to his fellow-members and they appoint a committee to investigate the matter and advise him therein. In a certain sense the institution is a trust in hearts, but its object is higher than that of most monopolies. It strives to reduce the unhappiness of the world to a minimum, and has been fairly successful in its restricted field. The sad news comes, however, that all the members of the organization are in love with the same girl.

The weight and bulk of the gold and silver of the United States treasury forms the subject of inquiry by people of a mathematical turn of mind. The weight of the gold is 601 tons, 2,000 pounds, and the silver 8,000 tons, 2,000 pounds, and the gold would make a baricade four feet high, four feet thick, for a distance of 235 feet, and the silver, if similarly packed, would extend 4248 feet, or five-sixths of a mile. If packed in carts, one ton to each cart, the procession would be nearly thirty-three miles long, of which distance the gold-bearing carts would cover two and a half miles, and the silver a fraction over thirty and a quarter miles.

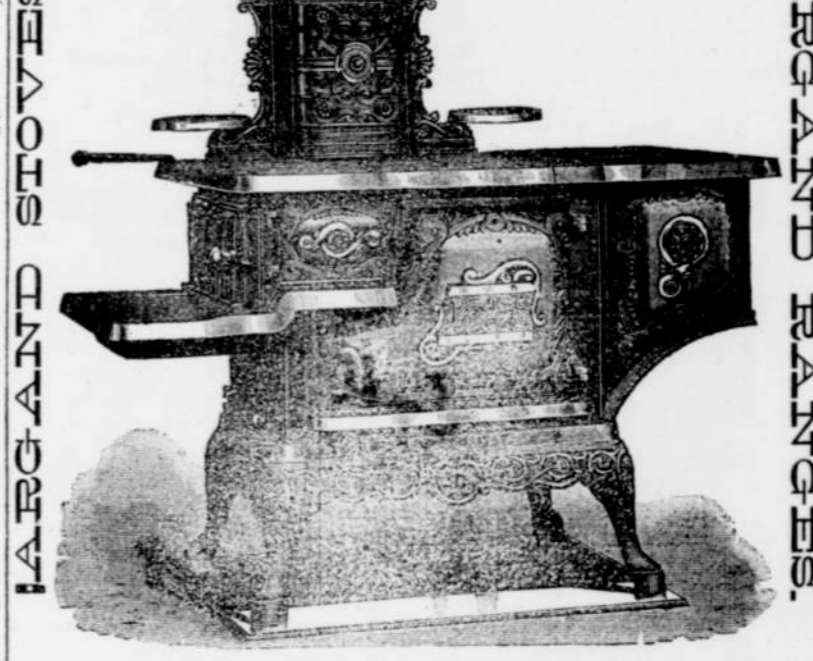
