The press of the East is agitating the possible presidential candidacy of Blaine in 1892.

Republican aspirants for the office of governor are springing up all around.

Just before the election Blaine wrote a letter endorsing the republican state ticket in New York.

The taxpayers and patrons of the McMinnville public school district will soon be confronted with the necessity of another school building.

At Monday's city election the old council was re-elected to a man.

Russell Harrison made his home in Montana. It went democratic this year.

Some of the republican newspapers are urging intelligent fathers who have sons to withhold their patronage from Harvard college.

The Portland Mercury, a staunch republican paper says: "Telegraphic reports from Montana, relative to the political troubles there, are published in this city, originate in the Helena Journal office."

IOWA DEMOCRATIC.

In its comment on the Eastern election the Oregonian of Tuesday says: "Iowa is probably democratic. The republican party has paid dearly for its stand on prohibition."

EASTERN ELECTIONS.

Elections were held in several Eastern and Southern states on Tuesday, the results of which are very surprising to the republicans.

In New York the democratic state ticket was elected by 20,000 or 25,000 majority, and the democrats gain one senator and ten representatives in the legislature.

The grandest victory of the year was gained in Ohio where the democrats claim the entire state ticket, and the legislature in both branches.
