UNCLE SAM'S CASH.

J. N. Huston, treasurer of the United States, has made a long report to the secretary of the treasury of the operations of his office during the last fiscal year and the condition of the treasury on June 30th last.

On June 30, 1888, there was in the treasury's custody, in cash and effective credits, the sum of \$764,729,333, and a year later the sum of \$760,643,871.

As the holdings of the treasury decreased in the interval in the sum of \$41,000,000, the circulation increased about \$8,000,000. The public lost \$18,000,000 of gold and \$30,000,000 of notes and gained \$56,000,000 in silver.

During the year the national banks withdrew \$66,840,000 of their bonds held by the treasury as security for circulating notes or public moneys. The deposits amounted to \$25,243,700. There remained at the close of the year \$148,121,450, belonging to 2,262 banks, as security for circulation, and \$45,222,000 belonging to 270 banks as security for deposits.

The report closes with some criticisms on the inferiority of the provisions for the safety of the public funds and the conveniences for the transaction of business, and makes certain recommendations for improvements in this respect.

A MANAGED PARTY. The elections of last week have given the republican leaders a pause in their plans for legislation at Washington this winter.

Unless the absurd trade barriers between those states and ours shall be removed Mr. Blaine's "Pan-American congress" will shrink to the proportions of a mere junket.

The rumor is improbable. How can a managed party do anything to liberate trade from its shackles? The republican party is bound and delivered to the protected interests. Their money carries its elections. Their agents conduct its campaigns.

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When the stage of the game had been reached the proclamations were turned face upward, but protected by the sheet of paper, upon which they had been laid. The sheet was slipped aside until the blank spaces for the presidential signature were exposed.

Do not say that the street car line will not be a benefit to the city, for it will.

The treasurer of the United States characterizes the past year as a remarkable one in the history of public finances, both the revenue and expenditures having been exceeded but a few times since the foundation of the government.

Finding that the sight was about to pass away forever from her eyes, she called her little ones around her, dressed them in their best clothes, kissed them affectionately, and thus, with an ineffable picture of those dear ones clearly imaged in her heart and mind, she bowed her head to the fate that withdrew the light from her eyes and wept with sightless orbs!

The Long Creek Eagle reports a little pistol pleasantry that occurred at Hamilton, Grant county, the other day. Charles Thompson and Lawrence Swick engaged in a quarrel, and the latter, losing his temper, took a shot at Thompson. Then the fun turned the other way, and as Swick turned and ran, Thompson fired two shots at him, but neither took effect.
