WEATHER-CROP BULLETIN.

For the Month of January, 1890--Issued by the U. S. Signal Office. WASHINGTON CITY, February 1, 1890. TEMPERATURE.

The month of January has been much warmer than usual over the greater portion of the country east of the Rocky mountains, although the excess of temperature in the central valleys is somewhat less than that was during December, 1889.

The month was colder than usual from Dakota and Colorado westward to the Pacific coast, the greatest departure from the normal occurring in northern Montana, where the mean temperature for the month was 5, or 12 degrees lower than usual.

The month was noticeable for the small number of cold waves occurring; only three of general extent having been observed. The most decided of which occurred from the 15th to the 17th, and was attended by freezing weather as far south as the Gulf coast and southern Georgia.

There has been more rain than usual in the Lake region, the Ohio valley, and Central Mississippi and Missouri valleys, the heaviest rains occurring in the central Mississippi valley, including Arkansas, western Tennessee, western Kentucky, western Indiana, and southern Illinois, over which region the excess in precipitation ranged from 2 to 7 inches.

These heavy rains were attended by destructive floods in the rivers of the lower Ohio and central Mississippi valleys. Excessive rains have continued on the Pacific coast and large floods have also occurred in California.

The precipitation on the Atlantic coast from Maine to Florida and along the Gulf coast was much less than usual, the deficiency in the south Atlantic and east Gulf states and southeast New England ranging from 2 to 4 inches.

At the close of the month snow was reported on the ground in Maine, northern Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Dakota, the depth over the greater portion of the region being less than six inches, although twenty-eight inches were reported at Marquette, Michigan.
