Thursday, April 24, 1890.

The republican state convention which met at Portland Wednesday, nominated the following state ticket: For governor, D. P. Thompson, of Multnomah; congress, Binger Hermann, of Douglas; supreme judge, R. S. Bean of Lane; secretary of state, Geo. W. McBride, of Columbia; treasurer, Phillip Metchem, of Grant; sup. public instruction, E. B. McElroy, of Benton county.

Geo. Bingham, of Salem, received the nomination for district attorney of this judicial district.

After an investigation of great care and accuracy, the special committee of the National Reform League estimates that more than one-third of the entire time of each congressman is consumed in securing offices for his constituents. And upon the strength of this, the league warmly comments the bill recently introduced in the house relative to the appointment of post-masters as fourth class officers.

The house has adopted the remarkable course of striking out of the naval appropriation bill the provision for three 8,000-ton battleships and leaving only that for a single-armed cruiser. This makes the slimmest appropriation ever voted since we entered definitely upon the construction of the new navy—a curious commentary upon the campaign promises to raise our fleet to a standard that would make us safe against any attack. The surplus is disappearing, but the public defenses are getting precious little of it. It is to be hoped that the senate will insist upon an appropriation for coast-defense vessels.

If harmony in a party presages success, the democratic party of Yamhill county will be triumphant in the June election. The convention Saturday was in very vivid contrast to the republican convention. In the latter every delegate seemed indistinct with the idea that the success of the party depended upon his being sent to the state convention. In the democratic convention the delegates were filled with the idea of electing the best men to go to Portland and serve the people of this commonwealth by putting up a state ticket which will be as much better than the republican ticket as the harmony which prevailed in the democratic convention was greater than that in the republican convention.

At the first opportunity the people of Montana have fittingly rebuked the republicans of that state and the U. S. senate for the flagrant steal of two senators. A dispatch of the 14th from Butte City says:

"Today's election was for the selection of seven aldermen and mayor. It passed off very quietly and altogether different from anticipations of both parties. There were 3275 names registered and about two-thirds of the vote was polled. It was a complete victory for the democrats, only one republican alderman being elected, and that with only a majority of 3. The issue today was one of vital importance. It was whether the citizens of Butte would sustain the action of the state canvassing board in throwing out precinct 44 and the right of the republican set of senators to seats in the United States senate. H. G. Valton, democratic candidate for mayor, was elected by 225 majority, and the six aldermen by majorities ranging from 58 to 125. The next council will stand eleven democrats, three republicans and a democratic mayor.

SUICIDE OR ACCIDENT.

Chas. E. Sitton, an old Yamhill Boy, dies under Peculiar Circumstances.

Nearly everyone in this county know Chas. E. Sitton, son of "Doc" Sitton, who lives near this city. Sitton was one of the successful business men of Portland, wealthy and talented and had everything to live for. This city was quite excited when the news of his death was telegraphed to relatives here on Sunday. The telegram stated that he had succeeded, but the daily papers of Portland on Monday gave a full account and the people began to change their opinion.

His body was found on the Mountain View park tract, about four miles west of Portland at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. A man employed by Jas. Laddlaw, the British vice-consul, made the discovery. He immediately mounted a fast horse and rode to town as fast as possible and told Coroner DeLin that he had found an unknown man dead. Coroner DeLin promptly dispatched a messenger to the scene, which was reached in an hour's drive. Mr. Sitton, in going there, had the Cornell road about four miles from the city and drove up the zigzag road, which winds up the hillside to Mountain View park and further on connects with the St. Helens county road.

It was on this unfrequented road, about a quarter of a mile from the country residence of Sam Schultz, the general land agent of the Northern Pacific, that Mr. Sitton ended his life. At this point there is a big canyon, hundreds of feet deep, and the road skirts the edge of it. Mr. Sitton drove his buggy until he came to a turn in the road, where two buggies could pass easily.

The coroner's assistant found the buggy on the very edge of the road at the extreme eastern end of the tract. It has a good elevation, and the northern part of Portland and East Portland and Albina are within view. The hitching strap had been tied to the horse's neck, then run through the bridle bit and fastened to the limb of a dead tree on the right side of the road.

Mr. Sitton's body was found in a crouching position in the bed of the buggy. He was facing the seat. His face was buried in his hands, one of which tightly clutched a handkerchief. He was dressed in a dark business suit and a light overcoat, and a light derby, and his hands were gloved.

On the seat of the buggy, to the right of his face was found a large empty bottle, which was supposed to have contained ether or chloroform. The label on it was numbered 198,429, marked "To be used by Dr. H. E. Jones." The label bore the firm name of S. G. Skidmore & Co.

The bottle was filled on a prescription prepared by Dr. Jones on March 25. It was a peculiar mixture consisting of one part of alcohol, two parts of chloroform and three parts of ether, and is used to relieve pain, or make a person insensible to pain.

Three more bottles were found in the dead man's pockets. One was medium sized, and bore a red label, across the face of which was written in lead pencil, "chloral hydrate." About a teaspoonful of the drug appeared to be missing.

One of the smallest bottles bore the label of Skidmore & Co., on which was written "Anti-pyrene, 15 grains." This bottle was empty. It contained medicine for headache.

The other small bottle had a red label with the skull and crossbones and the big word "POISON." It had another label reading "Caution" and "Do not be taken." There was a small of peppermint about the contents of the bottle. About a teaspoonful was missing from this bottle also.

It is the general opinion in Portland that Mr. Sitton took a dose of the poison and then, saturating his handkerchief with the anesthetic, pressed himself of the pain he knew was coming, and died an easy death.

DROWNED IN THE MOUNTAINS.

One of Jones & Co.'s Mill Hands Loses His Life in the Mill-pond.

Yesterday morning word was brought to this city that Allister Mackey, one of Jones & Co.'s mill hands at the sawmill in the mountains, was drowned in the mill-pond while handling logs between 7 and 9 p. m. In the morning in company with another hand, Mackey went to the pond and began getting the logs or logs which were being piled in the mill. The other man went into the timber for some logs, and upon returning he did not find Mackey and began searching for him. He saw some papers and a pile pole floating upon the water, and becoming alarmed, he went to the mill and told the men that he thought Mackey was drowned. The mill foreman looked for him, but not finding him they drained the pond and the body was found where the water had been 14 feet deep. A man was dispatched for the coroner, who left immediately, accompanied by Mr. Jones. The body will be brought here to-day.

Mackey was one of the best men ever employed by the firm, and has been working for them some three years. He was a native of Scotland and had no relatives in this country. His parents live at Perth, Scotland, and they have been informed of the sad occurrence. His father was a lawyer and he had received an exceedingly good education.

A Thief Caught.

Tuesday, M. M. Wardle brought into this city in a carriage a fellow who gave his name as Frank Miller. Monday the fellow looked into Mr. Wardle's house while he was absent and stole a breech loading shot gun, two or three suits of underclothes, a razor and a pair of pants. Mr. Wardle started out in the mill and Tuesday found him near Sheridan with the goods in his possession. He just collared the gentleman and brought him to this city where a warrant was issued by J. Loughary and he was placed in jail. Wednesday morning the examination was held before Judge Loughary and the thief was committed to await the action of the grand jury, under \$200 bonds.

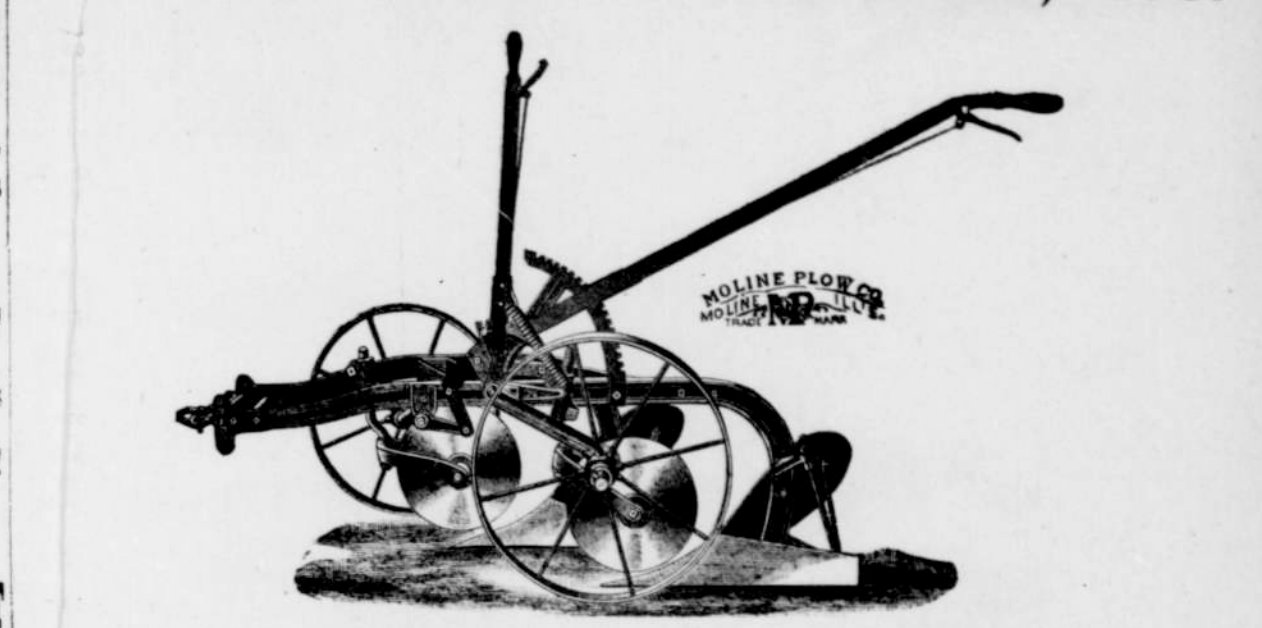
