WE MUST HAVE THEM.

TWO VERY IMPORTANT IMPROVEMENTS FOR US.

Two Locks Will Bring Boats to This City at Extreme Low Water.—A Ten Mile Canal Will Give a Fall of Over Fifty Feet at This City.

The improvement of the Yamhill river is attracting considerable attention in this city at the present time. Not only the citizens of this city are interested, but the farmers are taking an interest. We have learned that the fall in the Yamhill river from McMinnville to Dayton is only 12 feet and 9 inches; this fall can be overcome by two 8 foot locks and the water will be 3 feet and 3 inches higher at this place than it is now.

It is estimated that not less than \$25,000 is paid annually for freighting, by the residents of this city and section, with a competing line of freight steamers the freight rate would be reduced from 25 to 50 per cent. This would mean a saving of from \$5,000 to \$12,000 annually. This could be expended in various other ways from which you could gain more than by paying it into the hands of a rich corporation like the Southern Pacific.

River boats of the same class as the McMinnville draw about 25 inches with a load of 125 tons. Our old residents know that the McMinnville made a reduction in the freight rate. If this river is open to this city the U. P. Co.'s boats will surely run here as the company strongly favors the open river. There will be no boat companies in this city but instead two great corporations will be at war for the business of this section.

All that is necessary for the accomplishment of this great step in advance is the proper showing of the situation to the government engineer and then the government will build the improvement. Another scheme which is attracting the citizens of this city is a water power canal from the Yamhill at Broadmeads to this city. The canal will be about 10 miles in length and the whole of the Yamhill river can be turned into it giving at this place a fall of at least 50 feet. The difference in level between the water here and at Broadmeads is 71.05 ft., allowing fall of 20 feet in 10 miles we have a sheer fall here of 51.05 ft. Some of our mathematical geniuses will confer a favor by estimating the amount of power to be obtained by a body of water the size of the Yamhill river falling 50 ft.

This scheme does not interfere with the river improvement as the water will be returned to the river at this place to flow on its course to the Willamette. When people say that McMinnville is not situated advantageously, they are wrong. Of course a little stir and capital are necessary to get these ideas in operation, but greater things have been accomplished in other towns. Let us make them a reality.

The county court transacted the following business during the October session: In the matter of the guardianship of Albert Crawford, a spendthrift: petition granted and court ordered to make complaint. In the matter of the assessment of taxes of Richard Baird for the year 1889: Sheriff ordered to collect \$66, sum offered by R P Livingston but not accepted by the court.

Ellis Flett allowed free scholarship at state agricultural college. R A Stewart awarded the contract to build the concrete wall for fence around court house, at the rate of 90 cents per running ft. This wall will be 18 inches in height, 16 inches wide.

"Cap" Humphrey converted. "Cap" Humphrey has been converted to the true faith. He related to a group of friends this morning that he had become a democrat, despite his long and faithful service in the g. o. p. He had been presented with a wash bill on a meeting Chinnaman this morning, and he had concluded to join the ranks of the great "unwashed and unperfected," wherein the use of water is unknown. Old Adam is Dead.

The last chief of the Tillamook tribe of Indians has gone to the county where he claims grow on the bushes and where salmon disport themselves in the open air.

Old Adam is dead. He died a few days ago at his cabin on the Miami river below Bay city on Tillamook bay, and his remains were carried to the Indian burying ground at "Javon" above Bay city and there deposited by his sorrowing relatives and the members of his tribe. Before the Boston "man introduced the curses of civilization amongst the Tillamook tribe of Indians, their numbers were many, but now only about twenty full-bloods remain to hand down the traditions of their fathers, and now that they are without a chief and leader, they will not doubt scatter and vanish from the face of the earth.

He never drank whisky or used tobacco, and he always stood as a moral example for his tribe (which was not imitated by them to any great extent) and a friend to the white man. It is said he saw the first ship that entered the Columbia river, and his description of his sensations was unique and interesting. Bishop Gross called on the aged Indian chief on his recent visit to Tillamook county, and also during a former visit, and talked to him about his spiritual welfare. The Tillamook Indians were good boatmen. In the early days they used to put to sea in their canoes, and enter the Columbia river and the bay along the coast. The continued side by side posture in their boats made them low of stature and squat, and Adam was no exception to the rule, although he was of powerful frame. He always wore very long hair, and in his favorite occupation of late years, that of digging clams, he went barefooted and let the mud squish up between his copper colored toes. It always pained the old fellow to see members of his tribe or white men get drunk and carouse and quarrel, and his kind heart and good offices generally made him many friends who will be sorry to learn that he will hereafter forever leave the festive claim in his lair undisturbed.

Who Discovered Oregon? The following appears in the volume of "Resources of Southern Oregon" just from the press of the state printer: Bartolome Ferrel, a Spanish navigator in his search for the mythical straits of Anlan, reached on March 1, 1540, the 44th degree of north latitude. This was off the coast of the northern boundary of what is known as Douglas county. To Ferrel, then, belongs the honor of the discovery of Oregon, and to the promontories of the Southern Oregon coast will rest like the halo of romance the credit of being the land of all the northwest territory on which the eye of civilized man first rested. Sir Francis Drake, in trying to elude the vigilance of the Spanish by attempting a northern passage to England, arrived off Oregon coast in 1578. He landed at the mouth of the Tillamook and put ashore his Spanish pilot. This was the first Caucasian upon Oregon soil, 3500 miles from his Mexican home, left to find his way through trackless forests and desert wastes alone.

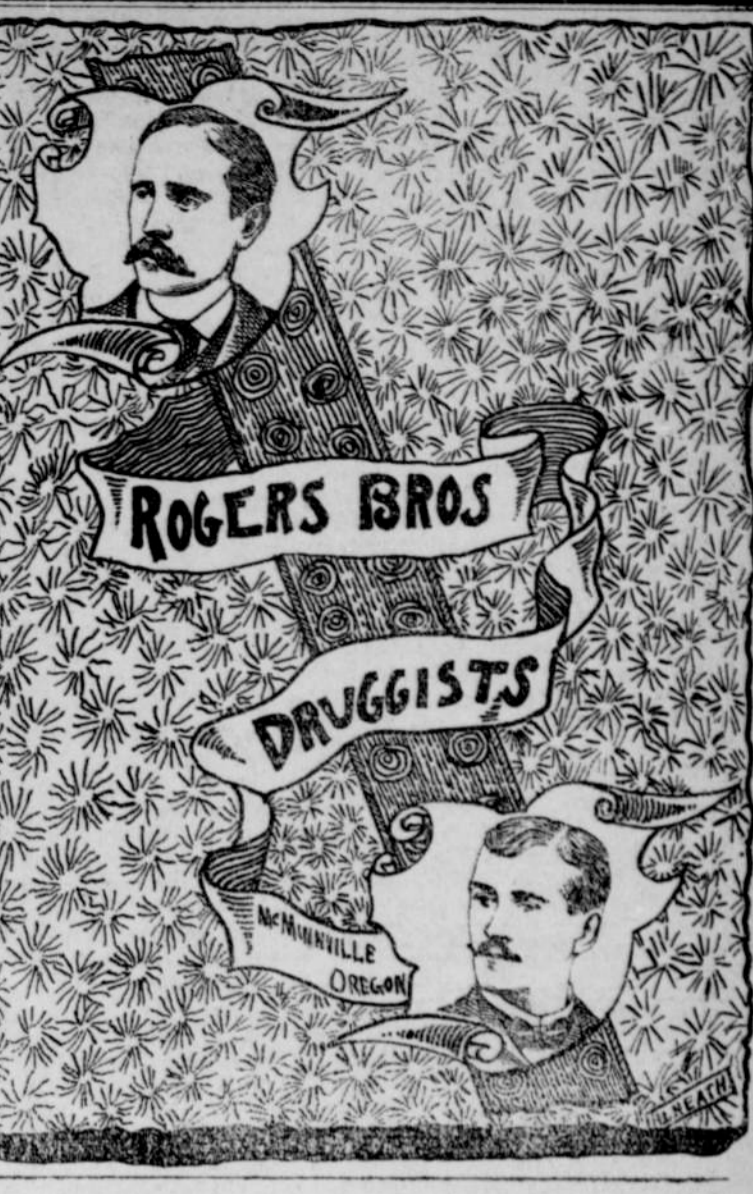

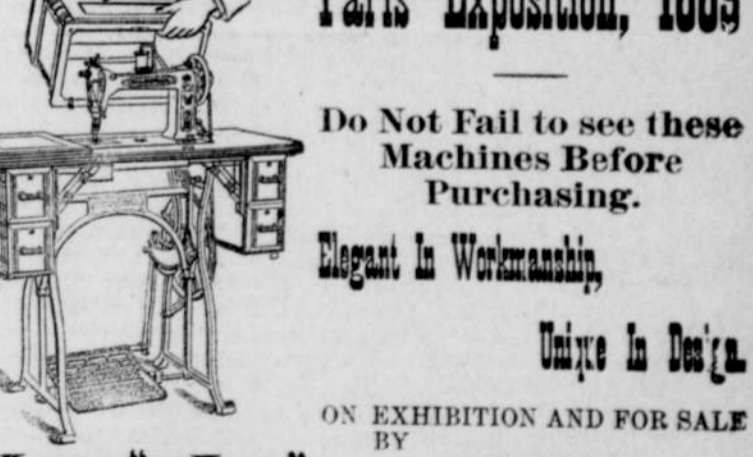
