Russell Harrison is making all the reputation possible out of the fact that his father is the chief executive of the nation. If his father has the sense necessary to properly conduct his own affairs he should call the young idiot up and chastise him.

After July 1, across the face of every stamp issued to liquor dealers by the internal revenue bureau, will be printed the following: "This stamp is simply a receipt for a tax due the government, and does not exempt the holder from any penalty or punishment provided for by the law of any state for carrying on the said business within such state, and does not authorize the commencement nor the continuance of such business contrary to the law of such state or in places prohibited by municipal law."

A table compiled in the census office relating to the public school finances of certain states, in which the Pacific coast states of California and Washington are included, shows that California expended more per capita for all school purposes than any of the other states, Washington coming next and Connecticut standing third in these expenditures. The higher wages paid teachers and the larger amounts paid for construction of schoolhouses in the extreme western states account for relatively greater expenditures as compared with those of the older states. Oregon is not included in this table.

Surely all this disposition on the part of the American people to do some foreign power bodily harm must come to something. There is not an American citizen who does not feel as if it was necessary that the United States should have a brush of some kind with some one. This feeling is not sectional, but is national. The Italian matter started things, and this last little affair with Chilean insurgents has made such a head of steam that it is necessary that it be blown off in order that the people can settle down. The prospects are good and no one seems to care whether it is with Germany, England or Italy.

In all probability the new United States navy will have a chance to try its power as a fighting force. The "Charleston," one of the new ships of the navy, is now going south at a rate of fifteen miles an hour, in chase of the Chilean merchantman "Itata," with instructions to take her when found. The Itata is loaded with 10,000 Remington rifles and 2,500,000 rounds of ammunition for the insurgents, and is hurrying for Chilean waters where she will be safe. The arms with which she is loaded were purchased of American manufacturers and were loaded on an American ship and transferred to the Itata as after she had been seized by the United States. The large Chilean man-of-war "Esmeralda" is waiting for the Itata in Mexican waters and will convey her south as soon as the two ships meet. The Esmeralda is a larger ship than the Charleston and carries heavier guns and the Charleston will have her hands full if she attempts to take the Itata while under the protection of the big ship. Our vessel has the advantage of speed and has a fighting captain on board. A fight at the present time would be of vast benefit to the new navy and every American has a desire that it would happen, although it would dirty up one of our new ships of war.

### ELEMENTARY INTERNATIONAL LAW

The Marquis di Rudini may have the municipal regulations of Rome at his fingers' ends. He may even know the civil law which governs Italy, but it is apparently impossible to teach him the code by which nations regulate their relations with one another, or the attitude of our federal government to the states that compose it, or to foreign powers.

There is probably no other statesman in Europe who would seriously assert that our treaty with Italy was broken by the mob that killed the Italian prisoners in New Orleans. There is not a half-fledged student of international law who would contend that a mob could break any treaty. Rudini is evidently in need of elementary instruction, and especially would it be well for him to read over the treaty which he declares to have been violated.

The treaty promises the same protection to Italians resident within the Union as is afforded to citizens of the United States. The obligation of the country to its citizens cannot be violated by a mob, but if the government should refuse to pursue the members of the mob the citizen or the foreigner could justly complain.

The government which punishes the perpetrator of an outrage against either a citizen or a foreigner is the state government. When Italy made its treaty with the United States it was bound to recognize this fact. The state in this case has not refused to punish the murderers of the Italian subjects, but the federal government has declared that it cannot force the state to hurry. The federal government could not force the state to hasten the trial of one charged with the murder of a citizen of the United States. And yet the legal remedy is provided, and the surviving families of the dead Italians have precisely the same rights that they would if they were citizens.

This is in accordance with our system of government as well as with the treaty, and Rudini has as much right to complain of the criminal procedure of Great Britain, with which the queen has no right to interfere, as of the fact that the state courts of this country have original jurisdiction in such a case as that in New Orleans. The system was made by us and for ourselves. If Italy does not like it the kingdom may have no communication with the republic or if they undertake to chastise us. The federal government will not try to avoid responsibility if the state declines to do its duty. —New York World.

### THE MICHIGAN PLAN.

The recent law passed in Michigan in regard to the election of presidential electors marks an important change of political methods in the direction of more direct government by the people. It is somewhat on the same line as the proposed amendment to the constitution providing for the election of United States senators by a direct vote of the people.

But in this case no constitutional amendment is necessary. The constitution provides that presidential electors shall be chosen in such manner as the legislatures of the several states shall prescribe. Heretofore they have been elected at large, all being elected by the voters of the whole state; hence, with very few exceptions, a state elects all its electors of one political complexion, and the minority of the state has no voice whatever in selecting a president. The majority in New York, for example, may be only a few hundred either way; yet, under the system heretofore universally in vogue, all its thirty-five votes went one way.

The new law in Michigan changes this and provides for the election of presidential electors by congressional districts. That state has two senators and eleven members of congress, thus giving it thirteen presidential electors. Instead of all of them being of one political party they will hereafter be divided, seven republican electors, and six democratic electors.

Two will be elected "at large," but the other eleven will be elected by districts. While Michigan has been for many years a safe republican state in presidential elections, it has some surely democratic districts. Its delegation in congress now stands eight democrats to three republicans. Presuming that the state will go republican and that the districts will remain as they were at the last election, Michigan will therefore elect eight democratic and five republican electors. This may happen to be an important matter in the choice of the next president.

If other states should adopt this method, it would upset all usual calculations and the result would depend upon congressional districts instead of states. Under such a system, the democrats, according to the last election, would have a walk-over.

SERMON PREACHED BY DR. TALMAGE ON SUNDAY, MAY 10.
