A Railroad Adjunct of Which Little is There is probably no department in

the service of any of the great railroad companies of the United States so important at times as that of the tcainwreckers, and it is doubtful if there is any other branch of the service of any of the great trunk lines of which so little is known by the general public, says the Philadelphia Press. Every railroad in the country has its wrecking crews and cars. The crews are Goods of all descriptions moved and careful handling guaranteed. Collections will be made monthly. Hauling of alkinds as "running repair men" and ordinary day laborers. The wrecking-trains are composed of windlass and crane cass.

The "running repair man" is, when not on duty at a week, working about the shops or yards of the company. He is more or less of a mechanic.
