THE STREETS OF PARIS.

CAREFULLY SWEEPED AND WASHED EACH DAY.
Perfect Pavements and Good Sewers make it Healthy. The City of Glasgow Pays For the Street-Cleaning by the Sale of Street-Oil.

Louis H. Gibson, writing to the San Francisco Examiner on the streets of European cities, says:

Given a city perfectly paved in all of its streets, sidewalks, alleys and courts, we may then have a condition calculated to develop a very unhealthy city if the proper attention be not given to the impurities which come in contact with it. The rain falls, the impurities are liquefied and by this means or by natural pulverization are made part of the soil. Thus, through natural means, all of the impurities are deodorized. An asphalt pavement, a stone pavement, or one of wooden blocks does not admit of the purification of the off-pavement is impervious to water, the wooden block measurably so after it reaches the point of saturation with the impurities which come in contact with it. The stone pavements, of blocks or otherwise, are, to a certain extent, impervious, though in the joints they may hold the impurities at all times. Thus all pavements in their natural state hold the foulness of the impurities which come in contact with them in a state best calculated to affect the health of the city. As said before, the dirt road, the unpaved street, the muddy street is its own purifier, the purification is natural. The soil takes up the impurities, and by a process of aeration and otherwise renders them harmless.

Each society is to have the oversight of the welfare of deserving soldiers and sailors. Its aim will be to secure employment for them when such employment is needed, always to assist those who are worthy and will be benefited by assistance, and to provide bountifully for those who are temporarily or permanently incapable of earning a living. Guardians are to be recommended for the families of deceased soldiers and sailors, and, without compensation, when their services are needed, though this does not include all professional services.

THE OBJECT OF THE SOCIETY IS TO DISCONTINUE THE INFLUENCE OF UNWORTHY SOLDIERS, AS WELL TO AID THOSE DESERVING.

In this point of view it is proposed to take steps to secure the cancellation of pension certificates when such have been secured by fraud, and the conviction of the parties to the fraud. In such connection it is intended to "destroy the industry of prosecuting claims against the government in the name of beneficiaries who should receive the full amount paid by the government on their account, not as a collection forced by process of law, but as a corollary recognition of honorable service." It is hoped to remove this question of pensions from party politics, also.

LOYAL VOLUNTEERS.

A Society of Men Who do not Desire to be Paid for Patriotism.
A new national society has been organized at Washington, with the title "The Society of Loyal Volunteers." It is a society originating among soldiers of the late war of the rebellion, though not strictly confined to those who served in the army, its membership its primary object is to obtain such a revision of the pension laws as will serve to protect the honor of those who volunteered for the defense of the Union, as well as to provide for the necessities of soldiers and sailors who were discharged during the war of 1861-65. Those soldiers who have framed its constitution hold that "the granting of pensions should be based solely upon impairment of earning capacity."

This committee has been assured of the hearty co-operation and assistance of such well-known and eminent Scottish rite Masons as Gen. John C. Smith, A. Pettibone, John A. May, Frank Luce, James B. McFetrich, Gill W. Barnard, and others. This will be one of the grand features of the world's fair. Masons from all parts of the world, of every tongue, will meet here as one family for the first time. Words can not express the anticipated pleasure that is in store for these fraternalists, who have a language common to themselves and will indulge on this occasion in a feast of reason and a flow of soul.

Sugar Beets in Southern Oregon.

Edward Albright, of Ashland, president, says the *Jacksonville Times*, this year produced on three square rods of ground enough sugar beets to demonstrate that they can be made to yield here at the rate of seventeen tons or over to the acre and that amount will produce in sugar according to analysis of some of Mr. A.'s beets made at the agricultural department at Washington a few days ago, 4,549 pounds of sugar. It has now so often been demonstrated by J. W. Wiley of Eden Precinct and others, that the production of sugar beets is particularly desirable and profitable in this valley, that it begins to look as if we are neglecting a great opportunity in not taking advantage of Sprockel's offer of a refinery if enough beets are guaranteed to warrant him in putting one in here. Who will take the initiative in inaugurating the enterprise.

The Truth About Smokeless Powder.

Hiram Maxin, the scientist and electrician, says it is a mistake to suppose that the discharge of a rifle loaded with smokeless powder is noiseless. There is, says he, no such thing as noiseless gunpowder. The report from a discharge of smokeless powder is much sharper and higher-pitched than that from black or ordinary powder; it cannot, however, be heard any thing like so far away. The recoil of the piece is much less also with smokeless powder.

OREGON'S DIVORCE LAWS.

Comparative Table of Statistics Showing that Multnomah County Takes the Lead.
The comparative divorce statistics prepared by Attorney E. L. Cox, and read by Zera Snow before the state bar association last Saturday, has given the Oregon bar considerable food for reflection, and a repeal of the present divorce laws by the next legislature may follow the report of the committee appointed to investigate the subject.

Mr. Cox showed that between 1867 and 1886, 812 divorces were granted in this county.

During these years the county had an average population of 37,170. During the same years three counties of Pennsylvania, with an average population of 43,333, granted only 149 divorces; three counties of New York with an average of 41,666 population, 80 divorces; three counties of New Jersey with an average of 37,333 population, 56 divorces; three counties of Minnesota with an average of 36,666 population, 199 divorces; three counties of Massachusetts with an average of 33,333 population, 189 divorces; three counties of Maryland with an average of 42,000 population, 84 divorces; and three counties of Virginia with an average of 38,666 population, 57 divorces. These comparative statistics show that Multnomah county looms up with an alarming majority of divorces. The records of the divorce court of this county for the past year alone has created a public sentiment in favor of a revision of the divorce and marriage laws now in force in this state so that it will become more difficult to get a divorce, and also more difficult to re-marry after a divorce has been obtained. The committee appointed by the state bar association to investigate Oregon's loose divorce and marriage laws will report at the next annual meeting with a bill that will be submitted to the association for their approval, and then taken to the legislature.

Stocks of wheat available east of the Rocky mountains as specially reported to *Bradford's*, amounted on Saturday last to 39,025,101 bushels, nearly 9,000,000 bushels more than at the like date one year ago.

Within the week they increased 2,448,108 bushels which is equivalent to gains of 900,000 bushels afloat on the canal, 522,000 bushels at Chicago, 217,000 bushels at northwestern interior elevators, 164,000 bushels at St. Louis, 169,000 bushels at Montreal, 151,000 bushels at Detroit, 101,000 bushels at Milwaukee, 95,000 bushels at Atchison, 77,000 bushels at Boston, and 52,000 bushels at Newport News. The larger decreases in stocks were 620,000 bushels afloat on the lakes, 257,000 bushels at New Orleans, 185,000 bushels at Duluth, 121,000 bushels at Kansas City, 76,000 bushels at Buffalo, 61,000 bushels at Philadelphia and 69,000 bushels at Toledo. On the Pacific coast the increase was quite heavy, amounting to 1,823,400 bushels, of which 1,000,000 bushels was at San Francisco and 500,000 bushels at Oregon points of report. The increase of wheat stocks east of the Rocky mountains only slightly exceeded the corresponding weekly increase in 1890, 2,292,418 bushels this year as with 3,395,000 bushels a year ago. On the Pacific coast, however, the increase last week was 1,823,400 bushels, as compared with 695,000 bushels in the like week of 1890. The total increase of wheat in sight (both costs) for the week ending October 10, 1891, was 4,270,598 bushels as compared with an increase of 1,090,169 bushels, one year ago.
