Only 176 votes were cast. G. W. Jones received 145, John Evenden 165, G. L. Baker 109, H. R. Heath 109, Chas. Palmer 104, J. C. Gates 103, H. L. Heath 85, J. J. Spencer 106, C. H. Neal 104. A Good Man Dead.

Hon. R. S. Wallace of Salem, the enterprising banker and popular citizen, died at his home near that city Friday evening, of pneumonia, after an illness of a week. His death was unexpected. The Statesman says: "Robert S. Wallace was born at Cambridge, Ohio, nearly 42 years ago, and received his education at the Monmouth, Ill., college. From this college he graduated just in time to enlist in the war of the rebellion, becoming a member of that part of the army which was detailed to service on the Mississippi river. He remained in the war until all hostilities had ceased. After the rebellion Mr. Wallace made his home in St. Louis, Mo., where, in connection with his brother, he for a couple of years conducted a grain commission business. Then he went to Chicago, where as a seed merchant he acquired the beginning of what soon developed into a large fortune. From the seed business he went into the grain business, shipping large quantities of fax seed to France and Germany. In this business he became a man of wealth. In 1885 he came to Salem. THE ELECTIONS IN THE EAST.

So Far as Known McKinley, Flower, Russell and Boies are Elected. The result of the elections held in New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Iowa, Massachusetts and other states have been anxiously awaited by thousands of American citizens. By the latest reports it is said that McKinley is elected governor of Ohio by 20,000 plurality. Flower has over 40,000 majority in New York, Russell has 5000 majority in Massachusetts; Boies, of Iowa, has about the same plurality as at last election, 6523. The Ohio legislature is republican, while that of New York is in doubt. Fassett, the republican candidate for governor in New York, did not carry his own town, Elmira. New York City gives Flower 78,000 plurality and Brooklyn 14,000. In Pennsylvania the republican candidates for auditor general and state treasurer were elected by a large majority. These were the only offices to be filled. Local matters entered largely into the fight. Governor Russell, of Massachusetts, has been re-elected and it is thought that the majority of the ticket is republican. A slight republican gain has been made in several counties in the state. In Iowa the elections were the most exciting in the history of the state. A heavy vote was cast but it is conceded that Gov. Boies has been re-elected by a small majority. In Kansas the alliance did not hold its own and there has been a republican gain. Heavy rain fell all over the state during the day and the vote is very light. Upon the result of the elections in New Jersey depends the election of a senator to succeed United States Senator Rufus Blodgett. The returns from this state are complete and the democrats have a majority in a joint ballot of 20. In Virginia the legislature will be democratic. But few republican candidates were nominated. Republican counties have elected democratic representatives. Two alliance men and one republican were the only ones of the opposition elected. The election in Colorado was the most peaceful ever held. The vote was very light in Nebraska, partly owing to the Australian ballot system which is proving very cumbersome especially in Omaha, where a large number of candidates were to be voted on the state, county and city tickets. In Maryland the entire democratic ticket was elected by 30,000 majority. The greatest interest was taken in the result in Ohio and the republicans are all smiling. \$100 Reward. \$100.
