THE ATTORNEY GENERALSHIP.

Mandamus Proceedings Brought in Linn County to be Argued Before Boise.

The Australian ballot law makes it the duty of the several county clerks of the state to prepare notices of the offices to be filled at any general or special election.

County Clerk N. P. Payne of Linn county, referred, in making up his notice of the coming June election, to place the office of attorney general in the notice as one to be filled at such election. A mandamus suit has been filed against him to compel him to so place the office in the election notice.

In speaking of the matter yesterday Attorney-General Chamberlain said "I do not care to be in the attitude of the state governor of Nebraska and claim something that I am not legally entitled to, although I claim the tenure of the present incumbent is until June, 1894."

Judge D. R. N. Blackburn and Hon. J. K. Weatherford of Albany will appear for the defendant, County Clerk Payne. L. H. Montayne and T. P. Hackman will appear for the plaintiff.

Judge Blackburn said, in answer to interrogation on the case: "My individual opinion is that the legislature intended the attorney general should not be elected until June, 1894, though in fact I cannot say much about it, as I have not looked it up. Other lawyers who have investigated the law give an entirely different opinion."—Statesman.
