The indebtedness of the district at this time is \$5500 and the bond issue will be \$5500. The cash collected from the users of light and water in this city by the superintendent amounts to \$446.20 for the month of May. Of this \$263 comes from the water takers and \$183.20 from the light takers. The total expenses of the plant for the month were \$322, leaving a balance of \$124.20. This amount should be increased by the sum of \$170, the amount paid by the city from the general fund for the street lights and hydrants. If this was paid it would give the water fund a balance, after all operating expenses were paid, of \$303.20. And still some of the councilmen claim that the plant is not making money.

CROP-WEATHER BULLETIN.

For the Week Ending Tuesday, June 8, 1893.—U. S. Signal Service.

The week opened cool and cloudy and a few showers; the latter part, since Saturday, has been clear and very warm, the temperature rising to above 80 degrees, as against 54 to 56 degrees last week. During the warm period on the 4th and 5th a fresh breeze prevailed. The past few days have been the warmest so far of this year, and have been as warm as it usually is in midsummer. The sunshine and warmth have been of great benefit to the vegetation. The air has been very dry and in some localities on lowlands the soil is baking somewhat; but no serious damage is expected. The reports are very conflicting concerning fruit; but from the best information obtainable it is but proper to infer that in the Willamette valley the peach, pear and apple crop will not be up to the average. In southern Oregon good fruit yield is expected. The spring seeding is completed; it is seldom that it is June 1st before all the spring grain is sown, but such is the case this year. Fall sown wheat is in excellent condition; it has rooted and stood well, and it is of good height. Some sections report it as heading. Timothy and clover hay was never better, and a successful hay crop is assured. Stock have improved wonderfully, and as said by a correspondent, "the stock is rolling in fat." Sheep shearing continues; good clips are reported, but there appears to be no market for the wool. Hops are growing finely and most growers are prepared for war on the lice as soon as they appear. Strawberries are ripening rapidly and the market will be overstocked within the next two weeks.
