Two years ago while the editor of this paper was in the 'Coast' mountains hunting deer he picked up a piece of decomposed quartz on a gravel bar and put it in his pocket. Last Sunday while several citizens of this city were discussing whether or not there was gold in the Coast range of mountains, he thought of this piece of quartz and searching his old clothes, found it. The people who had decided that there was no gold between us and the coast looked the piece of rock over and found specks of gold visible to the naked eye. When a glass was applied the virgin gold could be plainly seen. The quartz was carefully pulverized and from the piece weighing probably a pound, fine gold was extracted by washing in quicksilver and water. The amount of gold taken from the piece of rock is considerably larger than a pin head and demonstrates beyond a doubt that there is gold in the Coast mountains, and in paying quantities if a ledge of that piece can be found. The rock was not weighed and it is impossible to say what it would run to, but the fact is we are confident that a good prospector, one acquainted with all the formations in which gold is found, could find gold bearing ledges in the mountains west of McMinnville. The mountains west of us have never been thoroughly prospected as far as we can learn and are strewed with gold silver and similar mines that have been floating through this section for years. Considerable money has been expended by people who were not prospectors in looking for the lost Lamson cinnabar ledge, but without success. Because it has not been found is no indication that it does not exist. The specimens that were brought in by Lamson were declared to be rich by people who were experts. Uncle Andy Shuck, who is now alive and hearty, has in his possession some virgin silver that he picked up in the Coast mountains. A tenderfoot at gold washing can produce color from gravel bars along several of the creeks in the mountains and it seems impossible that mineral in paying quantities should not exist where there are so many indications of its presence. Beautiful Scenery. The Wonders of the Coast Mountains are yet Undiscovered. C. H. Fleming, Chas. Hazen, Wm. Toney and Dan Thurber started last week for Testament creek, on the new road, to enjoy a few days fishing. They found the road in better condition than they expected and also found plenty of fish in the creek. The weather, however, was such that it was impossible to do much fishing and they caught but a hundred or so. They explored a new section of country and found a beautiful fall. This fall has been seen by but three or four people and is located in the midst of an almost impenetrable part of the mountains. The water of the creek pours over a perpendicular ledge of rock over 100 feet high. The ledge is in the shape of a horse shoe and the water leaves it at the center. The pruned trees are full of fruit, but the owner expects to get well matured fruit of first quality from such shaped trees, where neither sunlight nor air can reach the fruit, remains to be explained. We know the owner is a pretty close figure financially, but our opinion is that it would have been economy for him to have employed a competent man to give him some pointers on pruning before he so nearly ruined his orchard. Some would-be fruit growers around Newberg are so economical that they can't find time to attend a meeting of horticulturists, thinking that it is time thrown away, but the chances are that in a few years they will find that this has been a false economy that they have paid dearly for. Better meet with your neighbors and profit by the mistakes they have made than to willfully go blundering over the same road they have traveled to their sorrow. —Newberg Graphic.
