SELF INTEREST DETHRONED.

The text of the repeal bill, reported to the senate from the financial committee, over which there has been so much wrangling, is as follows:

"That so much of the act approved July 14, 1890, entitled 'An act directing the purchase of silver bullion and the issue of treasury notes, and for other purposes,' as directed the secretary of the treasury to purchase from time to time silver bullion to the amount of 4,500,000 ounces, or so much thereof as may be offered each month, at the market price therefor, not exceeding \$1 for 371.25 grains pure silver, and to issue in payment for such purchase treasury notes of the United States, and the same is hereby repealed. And it is hereby declared to be the policy of the United States to continue the use of both gold and silver as standard money, and to coin both gold and silver into money of equal intrinsic and exchangeable value, such equality to be secured through international agreement as will insure the maintenance of a parity in the value of coins of the two metals and the equal power of every dollar at all times in the markets and in payment of debts. And it is hereby further declared that the efforts of the government should be steadily directed to the establishment of such a safe system of bimetalism as will maintain at all times the equal power of every dollar coined or issued by the United States in the markets and in the payment of debts."

How a citizen can come to the conclusion that the passage of this bill will bring disaster to the country is indeed a mystery. It is impossible to think otherwise than that the opposition is influenced by personal motives so far as the purchase of silver is concerned, for the bill does not discard silver and the silver mine senators have lost their market. The government is no longer the purchaser of their raw material and they accordingly fill columns of newspapers with statements of the dire results to follow the casting down of silver. They tell untruths and they know it. The bill does nothing with silver money but to make it safer and stronger. The only people hurt are the silver mine owners and they are but few. With the continued purchase of silver and a shrinking gold reserve every producer in the country would be hurt by the shrinkage in the value of silver and the increased worth of gold. Today the value of the American silver dollar has increased in every foreign country while silver as a commodity has shrunk to its actual market value and its price is regulated by the commercial law of supply and demand. It does not now have the government backing it as a commodity and its price is like the price of potatoes; it is actual, not artificial. As our gold reserve increases it is safe to coin silver. In the meantime give us a rest and the financial question will settle itself in the revival of prosperity which is sure to follow the dethronement of self interest in the senate of the United States.

AWAY WITH THE CRANK.

Carter Henry Harrison, mayor of Chicago, was assassinated by a crank having the name of Prendergast, on Saturday evening, October 28, at 8 o'clock.

The crank is a dangerous citizen and

his number is increasing each year. A great man is not safe and the president of the United States has to be guarded by police in citizens clothes to protect him from the cranks that throng the streets of the national capital and who attempt, in large numbers daily, to gain on audience with the president.

One cause of this increase in the number of cranks and their depredations on society is the lack of punishment inflicted. To preserve order and protect people who are of some good to this world it is necessary that sure punishment follow each and every transgression of the rights of others and offense against the laws of the country. Punishment must be sure, prompt and severe in order that law have the respect it deserves. An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth, and a life for a life is the proper form of punishment through which law will gain the respect of the vicious element. While sympathy is grand and good, its effect when given a criminal, upon future offenses should be considered. Nine times out of ten it is wasted upon the criminal and the effect upon one who is inclined to be vicious to the detriment of law and order. While we admit that lynch law is not the proper method of punishment, it is placing the power of the courts in the hands of the people from whom all power is received. The people substitute the law, the jury and the executioner, and the failures of lynch law to mete punishment, consistent with the offense committed, have not been as many as in the courts.

The murderer of Carter Harrison is known; he has no defense whatever except that his brain is out of order; he is of no earthly account and his act makes him an outcast in the hereafter; he is better off dead than alive, both to himself and to society; if allowed to exist he will be a tax upon men who are of use to this world. Let him die speedily; give him the same consideration that he gave his victim. Get him from the face of the earth; the world and its people have absolutely nothing for him, not even sympathy.

Carter Henry Harrison was born in Fayette county, Kentucky, on the 15th of February, 1832. In 1874 he was elected to congress, as a democrat. Since then he has been mayor of Chicago five times, and while he has been in a strict sense a politician he had traits of character that made him many friends and many enemies. He was an able editor and has, in many ways, been of great use to the world. His untimely taking off adds one more name to the column of great names that stands as a monument to our carelessness in protecting the lives of men who are valuable to the country.
