Republican legacies are giving the country a vast deal of trouble. First came the culmination of the mischief worked by the silver purchase act—a republican makeshift passed to protect President Harrison and to placate the silver states. And now the treasury announces a probable deficit of \$50,000,000 at the end of the fiscal year.

Judging from the dispatches things were mixed in the east Tuesday. McKinley is re-elected governor of Ohio and all the republican states elect by the usual majority. McKinley no doubt will be the republican nominee for president in 1896, and as a matter of fact will be defeated by some democrat, providing the democratic candidate is not David B. Hill, of New York. The machine which he represents is a curse to the democratic party and American citizenship, and if the party is to stand it must get rid of it at once. The election of Tuesday in New York repudiated it and it will be cast aside by the whole country providing it furnishes a presidential candidate in the next campaign.

Just why the administration should desire the restoration of the monarchy in the Hawaiian islands, and the keeping of Dictator Peixoto, of Brazil, in power, is beyond comprehension. The calling home of the admiral in command of our fleet in Brazilian waters, because he recognized Mello as a beligerent, is an act that does not reflect credit upon the administration. Admiral Mello was either a proper belligerent and deserved a salute from a United States warship or he was a pirate. If he is the latter our ships should have given him battle. If we are to interfere in the affairs of other countries, let the dignity of this government be maintained, even if it costs men, ships and dollars.

THE CAUSE OF IT ALL.

The democratic party, flushed with victory, victory that gave the party full control of the destinies of the country, entered upon performing the mandates of the people by introducing into its conservative varieties that only appear proper when they issue from an hysterical woman; then only proper because they are known as the result of disease and are harmless. Democratic senators and representatives have advocated measures that have only one reason for existence, that being personal profit. The blame for this has been

placed upon the party and the first effect is now being felt in the fall elections of the eastern states. If the western farmer must compete in the markets of the world with the peasant of Russia and the cheap labor of India, let him compete on even terms; give him the same market in which to buy.

Gone to Smoking.

S. A. Clarke is responsible for the statement that that hoary old sentinel, Mt. Hood, has gone to smoking again. He says he looked toward the old mount Wednesday morning about 10:30 and the sight to greet him was that of smoke issuing from the side of the mountain. He thought he might be mistaken, or that it was a drifting cloud or a bank of rising fog that had attracted him. But, no; it was a black, sulphurous smoke, just such as volcanoes emit from their craters when they are active. He could not be deceived. The atmosphere was clear and the dark color of the cloud-mass as it issued from the side of the mountain and lazily drifted to near the summit and off to the south argued to him that it was neither cloud or mist. The wind, too, was from the south, but the smoke from the volcano's smouldering moved off toward the south only to be caught by the wind and returned a half hour later within the limits of the present view of the summit. This is the third time Mr. Clark has had the pleasure of seeing old Mt. Hood smoke. The first time was in February, 1868, when the smoke ascended from the crater in a solid column instead of broken as in this instance. The second time he witnessed smoke from the volcanic fires was some years later, when the sight was similar to that presented on Wednesday.—Statesman.
