Away back in Ben Holladay's palmy days in Oregon, that whilom magnate of unsavory repute used to reckon his harpies and harlots, his lick-spittles, bosses and strikers by the score. He cannot wriggle out of his own odium by attempting to wriggle head first into "Mitchell," or any other superannuated bug-bear. Such a thing is out of date just now. The point is, while men are being assailed as "bribers," "bribe-takers" and "rascals" to have the miscreants ferreted out. "And which of all is the worst, he shall be first in condemnation." This much is due the people. Hence we take the pains of showing up the darkest, vilest record of them all, in that of Mitchell's menial and Holladay's stool-pigeon of other days.

And, another thought or two. The great, arrogant censor, with his characteristic recklessness charges this paper with "rejoicing" over the result of the election in Portland, last week. He can misrepresent that as easily as he can misrepresent all other things. The Reporter's record in this regard, needs no apology. It has steadily and consistently contributed its mite on the side of "temperance and morality" whenever occasion demanded it. It was doing that thing when Mrs. Gallagher used to speak over her own signature concerning some rights of a "dive," in the same columns that the great, arrogant censor is now filling with his bogus clap-trap on the subject of "decency and morality;" and we shall probably continue in the "even tenor of our ways" when the great, arrogant censor shall have gotten over his little revengeful mania, and will be hob-nobbing with the "whisky ring" and the "dives" as friendly as he used to be before they quit taking his paper and made him mad.
