AN ELEMENT OF ATTRACTION
TO IMMIGRANTS.

Every section of the northwest is eagerly calling for immigration, and in the effort to secure a share of incoming tide, the advantages of the different localities are set forth in glowing colors, says the *Oregonian*. The new comer is reminded on every side of the fertility of the soil, of the special advantages of climate, of the nearness to market, or of the hundred other things which are supposed to be attractive to thrifty and industrious people. But another consideration, almost as important as any of these, is hardly ever mentioned or thought of—that is, the moral and social condition of the country. The best class of immigrants ask always and first, what section is best provided with the various growths of civilization. Many newcomers are capitalists in a small way—people who expect to buy lands already under cultivation rather than to go into the wilderness, whatever his native advantages may be. They would rather pay fifty dollars an acre for a farm in a neighborhood well provided with schools and churches and well advanced in social respects, than half as much of equally good land in localities where these institutions are yet to be established. It should be borne in mind by those who are "booming" particular localities, that there is no better way of doing it than by advancing their educational and other social advantages. Independent of its use to the people already in the country, every school house or church built adds to the value of the land in its neighborhood. And not only is this true, but it is an attraction to the most desirable classes of newcomers, and it is vastly more important to a country to be settled by good people than to be stocked with fine cattle. The Willamette valley enjoys advantages of this sort over all other parts of the country, unless it be the Walla Walla valley, and it is reaping a rich reward for them. Through the enterprise and public spirit of a few citizens of The Dalles, an academy of high grade was established in that city two or three years ago. The purpose was to afford means at home for the education of their children. This has been fully realized, and more; the academy has of itself has been the means of inducing a considerable settlement in Wasco county. We have personal knowledge that three families destined for points further east, all of whom found homes in Wasco county because of the facilities at hand for education; and these are but instances illustrating a general tendency. The lesson is one that should be heeded.

The telegraph names forty-one Republican and forty Democratic aspirants for the Presidency, with Blaine in the lead among the Republicans and Tilden the favorite with the Democrats. If these two men should be the candidates, old Sammy will need more "barls" than he rolled out in '76; and it won't require 8 to 7 to convince him of the fact, either.

The New Hampshire legislature has been trying to elect a U. S. Senator, for several weeks past, but hasn't succeeded as yet. The Senator will be a Republican, but as several prominent crudities are in the field, it is hard to predict who the successful man will be.

To read our Democratic contemporary, down the way, one would be led to believe that an honest Republican did not exist. We expect he will be attempting to "palm off" Grover, Chadwick et al as Republicans, next.

Crop reports from Minnesota, Dakota, Kansas, Indiana and Illinois are, on the whole, favorable. Recent rains have benefitted crops in Minnesota and Dakota, but in the other places they have done much damage.

The Congregational Association of Oregon and Washington has been in session at Walla Walla, during the past week.

From what we can learn the editor of the *Register* has received a very savage letter from some individual unknown by us, and who appears to be acting on behalf of Mr. Nichols and his society. It is said this writer makes threats of bloody vengeance and dreadful retaliation in the interest of Mr. Nichols. We can hardly conceive a sane mind harboring such sentiments, seriously. But if such there be, let him consult the best of his discretion, and "rush not with mad blindness to his own ruin," and that of the parties for whom he is the ostensible mouthpiece. This community is peaceable and tolerant; but it is no temper to be trifled with.

CONVICTS CAPTURED.
On Wednesday of last week three of the escaped convicts, whom we mentioned last week, were captured near Woodburn, Marion county, the particulars of the capture being as follows: Four men from Stayton had been on the track of the escapees for several days. They had concealed themselves on the sides of a ravine through which the narrow gauge track runs, and the prisoners passed at about 9 o'clock. They were called upon to halt and throw up their hands. But instead of this they started to run. After calling three times the party fired. Bonchamp dropped and the other two made for the brush and disappeared in the darkness. Fearing that the others might be near and armed, the pursuing party returned to Woodburn and went out at daylight next morning on a train car. Here they found Bonchamp dead and took his body in charge and conveyed it to Salem by a private team. The Salem *Statesman* extra gives the following additional particulars: Soon after Townsend and N. S. Todd, who live near Townsend station, arrived with the other two prisoners. They had made their way up to this station, about a mile distant, and gave themselves up to Townsend and Todd. Bonchamp could have escaped, but Refuhart needed medical aid, as he was suffering intensely. Mansfield was put in his cell, and it was found that his wounds were slight, only three shots striking his ankle, and two of these glancing. Refuhart was sent to the hospital, and, upon examination, it was found that he had been struck by two bullets just under the armpit of the right side, one of which must have affected his lungs. The chances for recovery are against him, and he was breathing heavily and suffering untold agony. The reward was immediately given to the men. The gentlemen to whom the two men surrendered were allowed \$50 each, and Peter Heater, Warren, Gibson, W. Price, and Dick Kays were given the full reward—\$150 for each man—making \$450 in all. Five of the convicts are still at large, but it is hoped they will soon be recaptured.

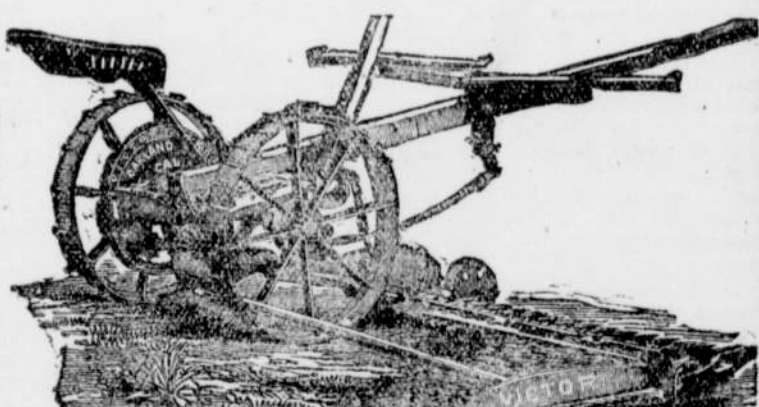

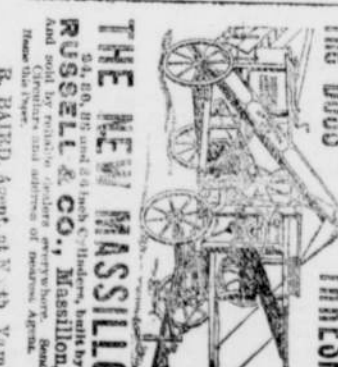
