

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Wheat \$1 per bushel at Oregon City.
Portland had a \$100,000 fire one night last week.
Lane county is out of debt and has \$7,386.88 in the treasury.

The early settlers of Polk county organized a pioneer society on the 14th.

The financial exhibit of Clackamas county shows a net cash balance of \$8,872.65.

Dallas is bothered by burglars. A dose of buckshot is a sure cure for that epidemic.

Eldredge, another of the escaped convicts, was captured in Portland last Thursday.

The wheat crop of Oregon and Washington Territory will be about 16,000,000 bushels.

Charles Godfrey, an old printer, died at his home in Salem on the 14th inst., of consumption.

Alfred Anderson, who killed his brother, was hung in Portland last Friday, protesting his innocence to the last.

Dayton, W. T., will have a hanging August 7th—Snodderly and McPherson, who killed Cummins, at New York Bar.

The last spike in the Northern Pacific will be a gold one driven with a silver hammer. Sept. 3rd is the time set to drive it.

The Oregon Construction Company wants 2000 men and 1000 teams to work, \$2.25 for men and \$4.50 for teams.

It is estimated that the population of Oregon and Washington increased at the rate of 1,000 a week during the month of May.

The distance by rail from Portland to Superior City, the terminus of the Northern Pacific on Lake Superior, will be 1,899 miles.

The Watchman editor says twenty-eight bushels to the acre will be the average yield of wheat in Walla Walla valley this year. Had it rained during June, 35 bushels would have been harvested, but we can't have it our own way always.

On Saturday, the 14th inst., at Marshfield, Wm. Ramsey shot and dangerously wounded O. Landers. The ball, from a 44-calibre pistol, entered the victim's breast and came out under his arm. The shooting was in self-defense.

During the year ending July 1, Albany had eleven fires, seven of which were started in unoccupied buildings. The total value of property burned during the period mentioned was \$14,977, while the insurance on the same was only about \$6750.

The Fallon brothers near Walla Walla, have commenced harvesting their 700-acre wheat field. Just to get an idea of the probable yield they run the product of twenty acres through the thresher and as a result obtained 410 sacks, equal to forty-five bushels per acre.

Tacoma News: The Puget Sound Baptist Association, at its meeting recently, adopted a report of the Committee on Missions, in which the "marked growth and prosperity of their portion of the Territory are alluded to. It is predicted that the time is not distant when Eastern and Western Washington will be united by rail, and when, together with British Columbia, this will form one of the greatest mission fields on the continent. The approaching completion of the Northern Pacific Railroad to Seattle, the commencement of the Cascade division at Yakima and toward Green river, the hopeful prospects of a railway down the Chehalis valley, the rapid filling up of our fertile valleys, and the wonderful growth of Tacoma and Seattle, are opening the way to an early combination of all churches in Washington in a Territorial Convention.
