McPherson, Snodderly and Owenby have paid the death penalty on the gallows—the former at the hand of vigilantes—for the cruel and cold-blooded murder of an old man near Dayton, W. T., for the purpose of plunder. They had their trial and were all sentenced to be hanged, when McPherson was granted a reprieve by the Governor. The citizen knew him to be guilty and not wishing to see the gallows cheated of a cold-blooded murderer, formed themselves into a committee of the whole, went to the jail, overpowered the guards, and took him to a tree near by and strung him up. Their action has a deep significance. It shows that the people have seen too many heartless criminals, whose hands were stained with the blood of their fellow men; turned loose through technicality and sharp practice, and that the only way to end this kind of business is by taking the law into their own hands. And the sooner this method is adopted throughout the country the sooner will outlaws and murderers cease their devilish operations.

An official statement, furnished by the Commissioner of the General Land Office, shows something of the remarkable rapidity with which the newer States and Territories are being populated.

As compared with the year ending June 30, 1882, the statement shows an increase of 35,212 in the number of entries. Cash sales, original homestead entries and timber culture entries, an increase of 3,505,843 in the number of acres entered. The amount received from cash sales increases from \$3,313,534 in 1882 to \$7,554,999 in 1883, or more than 128 per cent. The number of pre-emption and other filings, and of applications to purchase mineral, timber and State lands in the same States and Territories was 29,080, and the amount of fees received was \$64,856. The amount of fees and commissions paid on account of original homestead entries in 1882 was \$453,662. In 1883 it was \$572,630. In Oregon the cash sales increased from 52,319 acres at \$88,560 to 59,666 acres at \$123,503, but the homestead entries fell off from 153,532 acres to 111,476 acres, and the timber cutting entries from 88,038 acres to 35,464 acres. In Washington Territory, however, there was a remarkable increase in cash sales; also in homestead and timber culture entries. The cash sales increased from 71,214 acres at \$107,545 to 22,106 acres at \$571,946; original homestead entries from 231,132 acres to 386,778 acres, and timber culture entries from 87,524 acres to 143,412 acres.

**LETTER FROM AGENT WADSWORTH.**  
Editor Yamhill Reporter:—Dear Sir:—I quote from your paper under date of July 16th, 1883: "We are informed that about thirty persons who were bullied, badgered, and made to pay for the privilege of crossing the Grand Ronde reservation on their way to the coast at the mouth of Salmon River, received an order from the Agent at Siletz to depart immediately or they would be prosecuted for trespass."  
Now, my dear sir, as to the bullying and badgering, I know nothing of it. As to toll roads, up to the time mentioned above I did not know of its existence. That part of the affair does not concern me. It is the last part of the item quoted that I wish to speak of. I made a visit to that part of the reserve of which I have control, and found some twenty to thirty persons there, men, women and children. I talked with a couple of the men, whom I found to be gentlemen in every respect. During the conversation I asked them if they did not know that it was against the rules of reservations to camp there and they frankly said they did not. I told them that the rules and regulations in my office were such as would prohibit such camping if they were lived up to. They told me they were going in the morning of their own accord. After that, in the evening, quite a number of them came to my camp and had quite a visit. Not one word was said about ordering them off. I say positively that such a report is false. The people I found there live about Brooks' station, in Marion county, farmers apparently, all of them gentlemen in every sense, and I am loth to believe that they ever made any such report. I must have come through some Indian source. I do not desire the ill will of the whites down that way and I shall certainly do nothing to merit it if my acts can be rightly understood. Hence my desire to correct any false reports that may get abroad. On my trip down there and since my return, as well as before I went there, I was getting many reports about the whites doing so and so, many things about Sinnott's actions which annoyed me very much, and I did give my Indian police down there orders to stop people crossing. I meant this for a time only, until I could get posted on matters and also to correspond with the department in regard to the matter. I have no desire to interfere in any measure with the rights and prerogatives of the people of your counties (Marion Polk or Yamhill) or their pleasures. I am making an honest endeavor to raise those Indians out of the depths of squalor and poverty. If any of your good citizens wish to go down there let them write me a week or ten days ahead and I will send them such papers as will satisfy my police there that it is all right. Please do me the justice to correct any such statements as the one I refer to, and believe me, every possible courtesy and privilege will be granted to your people that can be and be consistent with my oath of office and the duties connected with it.—I am, Sir,

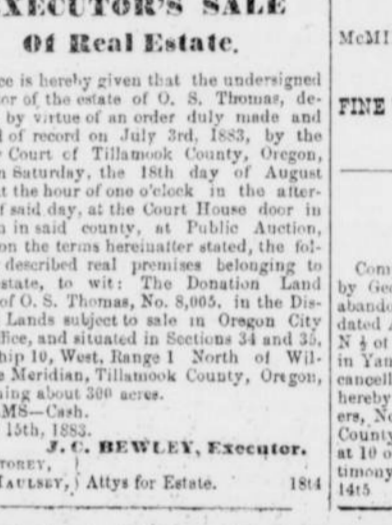
