

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

A destructive hurricane swept over Ottawa district last Friday.

San Francisco contains 70,000 visitors. Golly! but isn't that lots of 'em though.

The internal revenue receipts during the fiscal year were \$144,553,336, which was collected at a cost of about \$5,120,000.

U. S. custom house receipts in Portland for two days last week aggregated \$48,000.

Robert Johnson has bought into the Benton Leader, formerly owned by W. H. Mansfield.

James K. Polk Chambers, an early pioneer of Oregon died at Siletz Agency on the 10th day of August.

Fourteen persons bathing at Wells beach, Maine, were swept out by the undertow and drowned last Friday.

It is stated that over forty thousand head of eastern cattle have been shipped into Montana from the east this season.

Eugene McLin was arrested for stealing \$28.60 at Hillsboro from Fred Lahl. He was held under \$1000 bonds. Pretty heavy bonds.

The special train conveying the guests of the Northern Pacific eastward to witness the driving of the last spike will leave East Portland Sept. 6th.

A young man named Stout was shot and killed by a fellow named Clanton, at The Dalles, last Wednesday, as it appears without cause or provocation.

Witness against Frank James last week received notices signed "A Friend," and reading, "You had better be careful about your evidence against Frank James."

The corner stone of the Garfield monument was laid at Golden Gate park San Francisco, last Friday, by the Knights Templar, 9000 persons being in the procession.

William Mackay a young man of good repute, stabbed a railroad man named Dick Burns, at Albina last Thursday evening and has put up \$250 for his appearance at circuit court.

A man by the name of David Carnes, who lives at Waterloo, Linn county, and is 99 years old, has just filed his application for a pension, as he was a soldier in the war of 1812. Better late than never.

The wheat crop on the Coquille river is reported as extraordinarily good this season. Men from the valley who recently visited Myrtle Point, say they never saw finer fields of wheat than they saw up there.

The United States consumes more lemons in a year than all other countries combined. Russia comes next. The custom the Russians have of drinking their tea with a slice of lemon in it accounts for the large consumption there.

Between 3000 and 4000 knights took part in the grand parade at San Francisco, last Wednesday, every state and territory in the union being represented. During the parade three standard bearers fainting and one Sir Knight was thrown from his horse and had both legs broken.

On the 19th letters were received at Portland from New York over the North Pacific road which were dated Aug 10, 6 P. M., and the Kansas City Journal at the same time arrived only 6 days old. By this it will be seen that when regular trains get to running on the Northern Pacific, we can get mail from the east in from five to six days.

Walla Walla Journal: Dr. Mack's Fleetmont, yearling son of Alwood, dam Susie Mack, by Millman's Bell-founder, died this morning of colic distemper, culminating in pyemia or blood poisoning, at Tom Tierney's stable. This was considered the best colic of his age ever raised in Washington Territory. Nine weeks ago \$1000 was offered for him and refused. The doctor says Fleetmont embodied his highest hopes of a 2:37 trotter.

Capt. John G. Gibson died at Malheur City, Baker county, on the 20th. He was well known to early settlers in this valley, having been one of the pioneer steamboat captains on the Upper Willamette river, and part owner of the old steamer Clinton. He was a man of warm and generous impulses, and much esteemed by all who knew him. 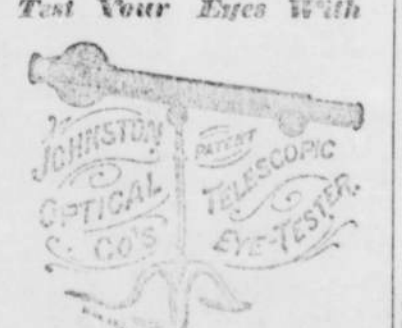
