YAMHILL'S FAIR GROUND.

Some of our enterprising farmers and business men have purchased land for a fair ground. It is the intention to form a corporate society to promote and encourage the agricultural, stock raising and mechanical interests of the county, and they should have the encouragement of all the good people of the entire county.

We hope that the projectors of the scheme will make the abstract very small, so that every man who has the interest of the county at heart, may become a shareholder and an interested member of the society. Then elect a board of careful managers to fence and lay out the grounds, make neat and shady walks, clean up the pleasant groves, and make delightful camping grounds where all the people of the county may come together and spend a pleasant week after the labors of the year have drawn to a close. Such gatherings are pleasant where men, women and children who have a common interest mingle together, comparing the work of their own hands, big potatoes, cabbages, apples, wheat, horses, cows, quilts, socks, and all the home products available, together with the reapers, mowers, wagons, plows, hoes and every mechanical and industrial contrivance whereby labor is saved. No one will say that such gatherings are not a great benefit.

As to sheep and thieves, let an exterminating clause be added to the police regulations.

We would like to suggest a name for the society, club, association or whatever it may be. "Agricultural Society" smatters a little too much of the rural. "Mechanical" is also too exclusive and sounds too much of the workshop; both good in their places, and underlying all civilization and commerce, and inseparable as men and women, but we think that the name "Industrial" better than either or both. It includes both as well as the arts and sciences.

## CITY DRAINAGE.

The rains of winter are here again to accumulate in filthy pools, endangering both health and travel, finding us even without surface drains. The surface of our city has inclined enough to drain itself, were it not for the obstructions the water meets with, such as worn out ruts, pools, and improvements.

A two-foot sewer, built with the same incline that Third street has, would drain forty blocks during our heaviest rains. One or two such sewers leading across half a dozen blocks each, with connecting drains from other parts, would be all that our city would need for some time. The cost of such drainage can readily be estimated. Of course some will say that it takes time, work and money to do this kind of work as well as to make other street improvements. So it does, and it takes some discussion of the subject, also, before anything else, and if there is no discussion there is no improvement.

**THE LIBRARY UNION.**—It seems that the originators and promoters of this laudable enterprise have become discouraged, or their time and energies have been absorbed in another direction, and the books and property of the society lay idle under lock and key, accessible only to cobwebs and the dust of time. An effort should be made to revive this organization or deliver the property to some permanent and respectable society in the town, or it might be placed in charge of the city council who should provide for its safe keeping and circulation. The foreign are custodians of considerable public property and they have a room that is well furnished; the city has done considerable for them and will probably do more and in return for this the council might require them to care for the library, thereby greatly increasing its benefits. We would suggest that the board of directors call a meeting and invite propositions from the various organizations regarding this matter or take action toward reviving the old organization.

The present city council coming in with the new charter, have had much to do in remodeling old ordinances and getting the new machinery of the city government in running order, and as there is always a lack of confidence in a new machine until it has been run awhile, they have probably not loaded it to its fullest capacity, or even made it do all it could have done. But there will be no such excuse for the council that is to be elected in November. Convenience, health, and even decency, demand much of the next administration; the most improvement with the least money. If any man thinks it easy to be a good councilman, let him try it; the opportunity will soon offer; but let him remember, official extravagance is never forgiven, nor good management ever regretted.

New York calls "futures" in railroads and stocks, Chicago sells futures in grain and pork, and Portland sells futures in oysters. Go west, young man.

If free trade and tariff are going to be some of the political questions at our coming elections, why don't the Register mention it?

There were very few foreclosures of mortgages at the late term of circuit court in this county. This added to the fact that several Portland capitalists sent word to several farmers in this county that if they were likely to be pressed for money to let them know it, and they would help the farmers out, means that we have several benevolent capitalists in Oregon, or the mortgage tax law is not hurting any one very much. Perhaps a little of both.

Villard is having a survey of the Willamette falls made with a view to establishing manufactories of various kinds there. With the thousands of manufacturers and artisans that this power will employ, the hordes of iron workers at Oswego and the many wool growers of eastern Oregon, a man can stand on his hind legs and howl free trade thirteen months in every year and he won't get a corporal's guard for a following.

The whipping-post appears to be gaining in favor among law and order loving people, for the punishment of criminals. Board and compulsory lodging is not punishment to a man divested of honor, and he thinks that the "way of the transgressor is soft." But with a cat-o-nine-tails and bastinado engrave a railroad map of Ohio about his spinal column and he will change his mind, and if he don't it will be a certificate of character to all future juries who may have cause to investigate such a passport.

The apple crop is not near so abundant this year as common and yet there are many orchards in the county where apples are falling off and going to waste that can be picked up and sold for fifty cents to \$1 per box. Any kind of fall apples may be cooked and put up in cans for future use. Apples are so plenty as a general thing that causing them to be hardy been thought of here in Oregon, but this year they would be relished as much as other canned fruit.

Men engaged in the lumbering interests say, "Cut down your forests; work them up and get the money soon as you can and lay it out in building railroads and the development of the country and its resources," claiming that lumber in the tree is so much idle capital. This is good financial logic for the present generation, but such extravagance will leave the coming man without such resources.

If we have many more trials like the Smith trial we fear that our county board will not be able to save \$10,000 to the county this year as they did last.

Classes in Book-keeping and U. S. History have recently been formed at the College. The teachers are willing and able to form other new classes, whenever there is a sufficient demand.
