McMINNVILLE, OREGON, OCT. 25, 1883. ECLIPSES.

Two eclipses happening this month makes the subject interesting. An eclipse of the moon shows at all points of the earth wherever the moon is visible at the time of the eclipse, while an eclipse of the sun may be a partial eclipse at San Francisco at noon, and no eclipse at all here; an annular or total eclipse is usually visible to about one hundred degrees of lattitude-a little more then half the distance between the poles. No eclipse either of the sun or moon can happen in the month of June and December for the reason that during those months the sun has won dered so far north or south of the orbit of the moon that the earth, sun and moon can not get in a straight line. The sun is farthest from the earth in June, and the nearest that time that an eclipse of the sun takes place the more liable it is to be a total eclipse, because the sun appears smaller then than in winter; especially is this the case if the moon is in perigee, or nearest the earth. The eclipse of the sun that takes place the 30th inst. will be visible to all of Oregon. The path of the center of the eclipse will begin about the latitude of Jacksonville Or., on the coast of China at sunrise there, thence southeast across Japan to a pointabout 500 miles south of the Sandwich Islands, thence curving slightly toward the north, ending about 1000 miles west of the southern coast of Mexico, at sunset here. The diameter of the sun will appear to be 32 '19" and the moon 29'22", hence the moon will not be large enough to obscure the sun, therefore it will not be 'a total eclipse.

Our interest increases in the grandure of these bodies moving through space in different directions and at varying speed, to know that they have not moved out of their accustomed orbit the hundredth part of a second since man began to compute it.

On Monday, Nov. 5th, takes place the annual election of officers for the City of McMinnville. There are to be chosen at that time 6 Councilmen, 1 Mayor, 1 Recorder and 1 Marshall In the choice for Councilmen our people should be careful in their selection-more so than in their choice in filling the other positions; for in their hands is entrusted the very life of the city, its prosperity and advancement They should be careful men; men who, while studying economy, should see that they were not doing so to such an extent as to imperil the city's interests. There are improvements that must be made before we can expect to be classed with the thrifty, wide-awake towns of our rapidly developing State, and the coming council will be looked to to see that these improvements are made. With these facts in view let a convention be called, and such a ticket as shall meet the approval of our citizens be nominated.

Many of our folks went to Portland to attend the Mechanics Fair and spent considerable money, thereby helping to build up that place. This we do not object to for we need Portland for a market for our produce, and would be glad if it was ten times as large; but we would be glad if the projectors of our county fair would get it in operation by next year, then we would receive greater benefit, have more enjoyment, and at less expense.

Railroad stocks are creating intense excitement, the country over, just now. For the past two weeks there has been a rapid decline, until it run down to about 30 cents. In consequence, many who had invested largely in this stock have been financially ruined. Severa prominent capitalists in Portland have been almost bankrupted by the decline.

A new clue has been found to kidnapped Charley Ross. A fellow by the name of Mosher was lynched in Wy oming, who wanted to live an hour, in which to tell that he knew where Charley was; but the mob didn't give him time. So the secret died with him, and poor Charley is still from home.
