STATE AND TERRITORIAL.

Seattle in council has decided upon electric lights.

Albany is to have a new public hall and theater in McMillan's block.

Walla Walla, W. T., shippers are offering 6-4c per bushel for wheat.

The heaviest tax-payer in Klickitat county, is S. Lowenberg—\$15,363.

Ice one-quarter of an inch thick, formed at The Dalles on Wednesday.

N. P. engineers are working out a line between Seattle and Whatcom.

A new grist mill, with a capacity of 125 barrels per day, has just been completed at Colton, Whitman county, W. T.

The up country papers are crying "More cars." Grain is piled up at all stations in Eastern Oregon and Washington.

Vinson, Oregon, is to have a brass foundry. Up there servant girls are in demand. The men wanting them are married.

Governor Newell, of W. T., made occasion to address the people assembled at the fair in Olympia the other evening and of course denied that he intended to resign. He is not that kind of a man.

Lying four miles northwest of Heppner, Oregon, says the Gazette, and west of the creek ranch of Steve Lallanes, is as fine a body of agricultural land as ever was fenced up and converted to raising grub for mankind.

"Who" exclaims the Wasco Sun, "says The Dalles is going down." Two new stores, one tailor shop, boot shop, barber shop, and a daily paper all started within the past few days and a national bank soon to start, means something.

A man in Union county, Oregon, was taken up not long since for taking timber off the government lands, and on the trial he proved that he was about the only man in the whole country that did not help himself from the government lands.

The Seattle Herald greets friend Blake in this way: Mr. M. F. Blake, the editor of the Sunday Star, expects to get the first issue of that paper out a week from next Sunday. The editorial and composing rooms will be in the upper story of the Post building.

A party from Canyon City, Oregon, captured a thief named Alva Tupper, last Sunday and found at his den a miscellaneous assortment of goods. The party in search fired eleven shots at the fellow but did not hit him. They picked him up at his uncle's a few hours later.

D. D. S. Brown, a government commissioner appointed to examine a portion of the Northern Pacific railroad, said to a reporter of the Rochester, N. Y., Democrat and Chronicle: "The Walla Walla Valley is the best wheat region in the world, a region which produces from fifty to sixty bushels to the acre without irrigation."

The East Oregonian says: Thursday 800 sacks of wheat belonging to L. H. Bowman, of Eureka Flat, W. T., caught fire on his ranch, destroying the entire lot of grain. As men were busy around the pile hauling away the wheat, it is supposed that the fire caught in the straw from a cigar or a lighted match. The grain was fully insured.

There are some three thousand carp in J. C. Wolf's pond at Clifton, Whitman county, W. T. Three years ago the pond contained three pairs of fish. One of the eldest fish weighed seven pounds. They were pronounced excellent eating, and the cost of raising them is nominal. Every farmer who can should have a carp pond.

It is reported by Mr. R. U. Goodie, of the geographical surveying party of the Northern Pacific railroad, as an important discovery, that Mount Adams is several hundred feet higher than heretofore supposed to be, while Mount Tacoma is 100 feet lower. The height of Mount Adams is ascertained to be 12,300 and that of Tacoma 14,250 feet above the level of the sea.

The Seattle, W. T., Chronicle of Tuesday says: Yesterday morning two Indians named Libby and Sam Cash engaged in a quarrel near Snohomish City which resulted in the instant death of the last named brave. Libby plunged a butcher knife into his breast and ended his career. The cause of the quarrel is unknown. They were both civilized Indians and each held a homestead on the Skykomish river.

Says the Albany Herald: Last week B. A. Hunsaker took his band of sheep over to Sand Hollow, Umatilla county, corraling them in town near the creek during the night. Shortly after arriving on the Sand Hollow range about 510 of them died. On being cut open the height of the probabilities are the market will be well supplied from now on to the end of the season. The meat is retailed at five cents per pound.

The Walla Walla Statesman of Thursday, says: We are informed that a fiendish attempt was made this morning to wreck the regular passenger train from Dayton. A lot of obstructions were placed on the rails, but for fortunately the cow-catcher cleared them off the track before the wheels struck, otherwise we should probably have a lamentable loss of life to chronicle. Some of the passengers were aware of the affair.

A recent discovery on the head of Cowlitz river establishes the fact that Washington Territory can now boast of the grandest cataract in the world, its height being 1500 feet. The Nooksack Indians assert positively that waterfalls higher than the tallest pine, fir or cedar trees are to be found on the extreme head waters of the Nooksack river. That section of the country has never yet been explored by the white man. From the comparison given by these Indians these falls must be at least 475 feet in height, which would lay over famous Snoqualmie falls of King county by at least 200 feet.

Says the Yakima Signal: The question has often been raised and discussed as to which of the several passes through the Cascades represents the lowest elevation. According to the measurements made by the railroad experts, their respective heights are as follows: The summit of Natchez pass is 4900 feet above the level of the sea; Tacoma pass, 3430; Sholes pass, 3060; Cascade pass, 2695; Yakima pass, 3625; Snoqualmie pass, 3110; Cowlitz pass, 5200. The elevation of Absworth at the mouth of Snake river is 350 feet. The summit of the Umpqua hills, by way of the Durr road, between here and Ellensburg, is 3500 feet, and the summit of the same hills by way of Pressy road, is 3000 feet.

The Indians are having rare sport spearing salmon to-day says the Tacoma News of Oct. 28th. The oldest timer does not remember when the salmon "jumped" so freely as for several hours this morning. Hundreds of them could be seen in the air at once, some rising several feet above the water, and it really seemed as though the bay was alive with them. This "jumping" business gives an opportunity for an excellent novel species of sport. We noticed a party of sportsmen out in boats this morning, shooting salmon on the "fly" with shotguns. A quick shot could kill his "bird" nearly every time. If hit, the salmon would sink on striking the water, but in a few moments rise and float on the surface. The gunners soon learned the ropes. It was noticed that each fish made three leaps from the water when it once started, say ten feet apart. At the first leap the hunter could sight his game, at the second, discover the direction it was moving, and by the third his gun could be in place for a quick shot.

"Horse Heaven" is the name of a locality in Yakima valley, W. T., and is described in this way by the Signal: The portion of our country which is now attracting the largest number of new settlers is a country lying south of the Lower Yakima and familiarly known as "Horse Heaven." The name itself is somewhat suggestive of the character of the country. Being covered with a fine growth of bunch grass, it has been for many years a sort of equine elysium over which roam large herds of "firey, untamed steeds," throughout both winter and summer. It is an immense country in size, some of it including within the Walla Walla land district and the remainder in the district of lands subject to entry at Yakima. Principally all of it lies in Yakima county. From the Columbia river opposite the towns of Wallula and Umatilla, this great country rises gradually until it terminates in the bluff which overlooks the Yakima. The Columbia river at Umatilla is just 320 feet above the level of the sea, while the bluff overlooking the Yakima which marks the northern termination of the "Horse Heaven" country, is 1400 feet above the sea. From top of this bluff one may look down upon Prosser falls, on the Yakima just 1000 feet below, or 600 feet above the level of the sea.
