Mr. Jake Mann, of Tacoma, W. T., is here, visiting relatives.  
Lafayette's popular postmaster, John Hubbert, Esq., paid us a flying visit one day last week.  
The W. C. T. U. will give another of their very enjoyable entertainments at the M. E. Church next Friday evening.

### LAFAYETTE.

Dec. 11, 1883.

Although it is well into the first month of winter, there is little of that rigorous season experienced so far. All, or nearly all, the fall sowing has been done, and farmers are taking advantage of the good weather and fine condition of the ground to do all the winter following necessary for the spring crop.  
The Lafayette hunting club had a meeting last week, and elected J. W. Hickey and A. P. Fletcher captains for the regular Christmas hunt. Quite a number have signed their names as wishing to take a part.
