

STATE AND TERRITORIAL.

Diphtheria prevails in Southern Oregon. Fourteen inches of snow at Ellensburg, W. T. The coal mine near Silverton, Oregon is being developed.

Emigrants are crowding into the country back of Spokane Falls. A black walnut grove is one of the thrifty growing interests near Spokane Falls.

Fifteen miles of the Pendleton and Walla Walla railroad have been completed.

There are 42 U. S. pensioners in Spokane county, W. T. Collectively they receive \$276.70 per month.

A California paper says: It looks as if Washington Territory would remain outside the pale of sisterhood for many years to come.

Thomas Humphrey, whose farm is near Albany, Oregon, lost his barn, 900 bushels of wheat and 300 bushels of oats by fire last week.

A good graded school is about to be established at Grant's Pass, Oregon, which will be something more in favor of that enterprising place.

The *Scout* published at Union, Or., is to be sold at public auction December 10th. Chance for somebody to pay a \$1,000 mortgage and something else.

The Tacoma News says that Johnson's object for a division of Washington Territory has not the sympathy of a dozen people on the shore of Puget Sound.

At the town election held at Tumwater last Monday, says the *Chehalis Nugget*, 23 ladies voted under the late suffrage act. Five trustees were elected, and it is needless to say that the women's ticket won the day.

Superintendent Clucas, of the Cedar river extension, says the salmon are so thick that it is impossible to cross the streams. He was one hour in the effort to cross a stream forty feet in width on account of the aforesaid obstruction.

Joseph Crank, an old resident of Oregon, also an old miner, says the *Pendleton Tribune*, reports that he has found a silver quartz ledge forty miles from here in the Blue mountains. Mr. Crank sent a specimen of the quartz to an assayer and found it to yield \$22.50 per ton.

The hop crop in Puyallup valley this season says the *Olympia Standard* amounts to \$600,000 bales, or 1,110,000 pounds. This is about one-half the yield estimated early in the spring, based upon the largely increased acreage, and is nearly 500,000 pounds short of last year's crop.

Sixes mines, from all appearances, are soon to experience a boom that the most sanguine never dreamed of. The Coos and Curry mining company (Blue Bonanza), represented by Messrs. Wilson and Jenkins, says the *Marshfield Mail*, are preparing to open up their valuable placer and quartz mines near the south fork. The quartz ledge has been traced for over a mile, and assays from a number of places go to show that it is one of the richest leads yet discovered in Southern Oregon.
