The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers or periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them in the office, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

4. The Postmaster-General has decided

that postmissiers who fail to notify publishers when subscribers remove, or fail to take their papers from the postoffice, shall be responsible for their subscription.
