At Home, Jan. 1, 1884.

Ed. Reporter.—While I am resting and recuperating I will jot down a few of the incidents of my trip to "America," though possibly it may not prove very interesting reading matter for the average reader of the Reporter.

I left McMinnville on the morning train, Monday, Oct. 1st, 1883, for my old home at Beardsdown, Cass county, Ill. Arriving at Portland, the balance of the day was used up in getting my ticket for the overland trip.
