### LAFAYETTE

Jan. 14, 1884.

If the Oregon grange had held a convention to decide the kind of weather they wanted, they would hardly have asked or expected anything more suited to their wants, and it is a wonder nobody grows about the weather.

There is a great deal of winter-fallowing being done on ground high and dry enough, and if this weather continues, the spring sowing will begin early and end before the spring rain season, except in low grounds, where they must wait until the water goes off and the land dries.

Last week was Co. Court all the week and it will be continued this week. The cause of so long a term is partly on account of its business and partly because the Co. Judge was called to Portland, to represent Yamhill, in the mortgage tax case, which is now pending at that place.

Among the visitors, called here on court business I saw Capt. Lafollett, of Sheridan, Harvey Jones, of Bellevue, Stanley Umphlett, Smith Allen, J. W. Alderman and H. Burch of Amity, and hold on I almost forgot "old Charlie" Thurber.

The following brings us to the question of "who killed the dog?" Perhaps nothing could be more radically wrong than the means by which the temperance people are trying to eradicate intemperance. For fifty

years they have been working at this problem; the immense amount of liquor drunk and money wasted, has been told over and over; the number of paupers made, has been pointed out and the liquor calculated to a fraction. But the liquor still goes, the money is still squandered; paupers grow no fewer, and drunkards graves are filled as fast as ever. But the latest remedy is perhaps the most silly of all—the attempt to eradicate intemperance by legislation. Let us suppose that the people were afflicted with ugly repulsive sores on their faces, and the physicians called in to cure the evil. What would they do? Search for the cause of the disease of course, you will say; but suppose they would petition the Legislature to force a law prohibiting people from having pimples on their faces what would be thought of them? They would certainly be set down as a set of contemptible quacks of course, and ordered to stand aside.

Our temperance physicians blame the distiller and saloon keeper for the drunkenness prevalent. As well blame the butcher and baker for the scrofulous pimples. Scrofula is a disease, so is drunkenness, and both can be cured by finding the original cause and applying the proper remedy. But it can't be done by scolding; it cannot be done by the most elaborate display of all the horrible statistics that can be produced and least of all, by legislation. Legislation could no more keep whisky from the drunkard than it could keep pork, sizzar and other scrofula producing food from your pimple-faced neighbor. Not being a physician, I offer no remedy, but leave that to those self constituted physicians who are trying to cure it. I would however, suggest a suspension of all the harsh intemperance and unchristian language that most of these reformers are in the habit of using, and try instead, just a little kindness. "Junius" in last Reporter throws out some very good hints that might be profitably acted upon.
