Suffrage Meeting at Lafayette.

ED. REPORTER.—The decade meeting of the Yamhill County Woman Suffrage Association met on last Wednesday evening at Lafayette, and Littlefield's Hall was crowded with eager listeners. Mrs. S. M. Kelly called the meeting to order, stating the object of this body and its working for the past ten years.

The Lafayette Choral Society opened the programme of the evening, and furnished music at intervals during the exercises. This society deserves more comment than space permits, save that it added much interest to the meeting.

Mrs. H. A. Longhary, of McMinnville, was introduced for a short speech, since long ones could not be tolerated because so many desired to speak.

Mrs. Irene Calbreath followed with a very logical essay of reasons why unrepresented woman is demanding the ballot.

Mr. A. Hurley was next on the programme, and was given a half-hour to view the question from a legal standpoint; he gave the origin and theory of suffrage, said man was once without it and showed by historical research how circumstances, changes and developments gave men this privilege, and that circumstances and changes in society and the civil government suggested and demanded as an act of justice the same for woman.

Hon. W. D. Fenton was next called for and readily responded with one of the most logical pleas for woman's enfranchisement we seldom hear, and yet he is free to state that he is not sufficiently convinced of its expediency to pledge his vote next June for the "Amendment," but like a true, honest and loyal man, opens his mind to conviction. He stated in a very impressive manner the fact that his sister in W. T. is a voter, and seven brothers in Oregon soon will be voters, while his mother who bore them all, and his estimable wife were not voters, and that in such differences there seemed something wrong.

We venture this, that no man who has such a high regard for his mother, wife and sister, and is not afraid to express it, can be other than a friend to woman's cause, though his mind is not yet made up.

Mrs. Eva Longhary next gave a reading—"Rock me to sleep, Mother"—in such an easy and pathetic manner as to meet with general applause.

Following this came one of Mrs. M. F. Cooke's earnest appeals to Yamhill voters for a candid and just consideration of our claims. Other brief speeches were made by Judge Townsend, Mrs. Jacobs and others when the meeting was forced to adjourn on account of the lateness of the hour. After a parody on "Marching through Georgia," by the Choral Society, the audience dispersed, but by a little strategy on the part of a friend we were made to halt at the door by a surprise serenade by the Lafayette band, which called out a response from the undersigned, noting the change of sentiment in a few years when coming out of a meeting of the kind, the leaders were met with sneers, paper wads, mud balls, eggs, etc., and now it is everywhere sweet strains of music, which with its elevating influences always awakens kind feelings.

At a business meeting the following morning a vote of thanks was tendered the Lafayette Choral Society, the band, the "Oregon Register" and the YAMHILL REPORTER for favors.

ANNUAL MEETING

At the annual meeting of the Board of Managers of the Oregon State Agricultural Society, held at Salem, on Dec. 4th, and 5th, 1883, by vote of the Board, the executive committee was instructed to prepare a statement for publication to the people, relative to the views of the members of the Board upon the subject of licensing the sale of spirituous liquors and the practice of the gambling devices.

We conclude from the comments of the press of the State, that large numbers of the people as well as the editors of the papers published in Oregon are under the impression that the officers of the Oregon State Agricultural Society have been licensing the sale of spirituous liquors on the fair grounds and the gambling games practiced during fair week.

In view of this fact we have deemed it but just to say that this Society has not in years past licensed the sale of spirituous liquors at any of the fairs; nor have we licensed any of the gambling or seep games, but on the other hand we have endeavored to prevent all persons from engaging in the violation of the laws of this State, by warning them of the risk they ran of being prosecuted and punished by the proper officers of the county, and we will not permit or allow anyone to engage in or sell spirituous liquors or engage in any gambling device upon the fair grounds, so far as it is possible for us to prevent the same.

In view of this fact, we would ask the papers of this state to publish this statement, and also state to all persons that it is the determination of the officers of this society to ask, and demand the co-operation of the civil officers of the various counties, to arrest and punish all persons that may be found at, or upon the fair grounds of this society, engaged in any violation of the law of this state.

We sincerely hope that this warning will be heeded and that all persons coming to our fair, will refrain from attempting to practice or carry on, or engage in any pursuit for which they will themselves be liable to arrest under the laws of this state.

We would ask all good citizens in attendance at the fair to aid us in giving the necessary evidence to the officers to insure the conviction of all persons, who may in any way violate the laws of this state.

The board of managers at the same meeting passed the following resolutions and we would ask the papers of this state to give us space for their publication, that all persons may be informed of the action of the board upon the subject as to the course we intend to take towards all persons found upon the fair grounds violating the laws of this state.

Resolved, "That no license shall be granted by this society at the next annual fair for the sale of spirituous liquors."

Resolved, "That no license shall be granted by this society for the operation of any gambling device prohibited by the statutes of Oregon."

Sheriff's Sale.

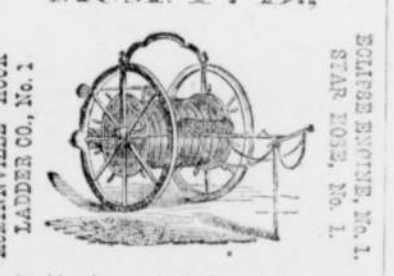
