The seal fishing begins this week. The price of saques will suffer a decline.

The iron has entered the soul of Seattle—the place is to have a stove foundry.

Gathering buffalo bones at from \$8 to \$10 per ton engages the time of some Dakota settlers at present.

Jacksonville, Oregon jail is crowded with the miners who fought on one side of the Kelly-Ruble affair.

In local matters the Olympia, W. T., Courier accuses somebody of "skulduggery" in localing boundaries.

Whatcom county, W. T., leads in the production of oats this season, the aggregate yield being 40,000 bushels.

The agent of the refrigerating company failing to find enterprise in The Dalles, has gone to Blalocks station to look for a location.

A company to establish the First National bank of The Dalles has been incorporated. A brick building will be erected for the institution.

Moscow, Idaho, has a public library of 2500 volumes, a ladies' reading room society, and a city of lovely maids and matrons to form the social circle.

A Seattle boy, a mere chunk of a fellow has opened up a messenger service there. As soon as it pays, some rich capitalist will step in and knock him out.

There are 14 lodges of Good Templars reported in Marion county and three in Clackamas, with a membership of over 800, and several lodges of Band of Hope.

The recent discovery in Cœur d'Alone mountains promises to be of great importance to our interests. The country is extremely rich in silver, tellurium and free milling gold.

Seattle, Port Townsend and Olympia have sent "largely signed," so the papers assert, petitions to Washington asking the reappointment of Governor Newell. Tacoma has not as yet signed very largely, says the News.

Last season Ed. Fallon, of Walla Walla, picked and cured from one and one half acres of land, 2600 pounds of fine hops. The hops were sold to Stahl, and were pronounced by his brewer better hops than he had seen on the coast. Next fall Mr. Fallon will have 25 acres of hops to pick.

In his recently made report Vice President Oakes says: In Oregon and Washington thus far the grain shipments east of the Cascades have been 83,000 tons, against 44,000 for the same period in 1882, and there still remain 40,000 tons, which will bring the total surplus to 124,000 for the season of 1883.

A citizen states, says the Oregon City Courier, that a store in this town charged 37 and one half cents a yard for a piece of dry goods for ladies wear, which, upon careful inquiry, it was learned could be bought in Portland for 12 and one half cents. No doubt such cases occur repeatedly. No wonder farmers go to Portland to do their trading.
