REPUBLICAN STATE CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

A meeting of the Republican State Central Committee of the State of Oregon is hereby called, to be held in the city of Portland on Thursday, February 21, 1884, at 11 o'clock a. m. A full attendance is earnestly desired.

The twelfth annual convention of the Oregon State Woman Suffrage Association will be held at Turn Hall in Portland on Tuesday and Wednesday, February 12th and 13th, 1884.

The free trade democrat is a very hard party to please; for years and years he has been grieving over the high prices, caused by tariff, but suddenly his Rip Van Winkle sleep has been broken and he finds that prices are actually lower than before notwithstanding the tariff. But it would not do to acknowledge that the tariff could even do good; so he now turns tail and abuses the tariff for making prices so low, things too cheap.

Of a kindred nature to the above is Slater's letter to the Wool Growers Association of Oregon. It seems, that the Association had a meeting and passed a resolution demanding "that our Senators and Representatives use their utmost endeavor to restore the old tariff on wool;" a copy of which was forwarded to Mr. Slater. In reply Slater tells them that he doesn't propose to be demanded, that they, the wool growers, are not more than one-seventh of the population, any how; that he knows more than these one in seven. And then he proceeded to tell them that the old six-sevenths don't want tariff on wool and can't have it with his consent. Then he proceeded to say that the old tariff means three cents higher per pound for wool, (remember he says 3 cents per pound higher) and wades through a half a column of platitudes to prove it, when all at once he turns tail and says:

"It has been demonstrated over and over again from the statistics of wool prices in this country, covering a period of many years, during which time wool has been subjected to varying duties, sometimes practically prohibiting, at other times letting in the lower grades entirely free, with a moderate duty upon the higher priced and finer grades, that the domestic product has always borne better prices under low tariff or when wool was free than periods of high duties. This fact has been reiterated in this country and elsewhere many times by publicists of the highest character."

How he proposes to reconcile this last statement with his first, is more than we can see. In the first part he tells them that a tariff would be 3 cents more to the price of wool and in the last part he gravely asserts, and brings proof of its truth, that wool was always highest when the tariff was lowest. Could anything be more absurd than putting two such opposite statements in the same letter and gravely give it to the world as doctrine on a great political question. The first part of the letter contains a downright insult to a very important class of Oregon producers; the last part contradicts the very gist of the first part, and the whole is a weak and silly effusion, a disgrace to Oregon Statesmanship.
