Bandon, Oregon, is filling up rapidly with an excellent class of emigrants.

For the second time within three months, Newell, of W. T., has given the State prison contractors a clean bill of health.

The railroad construction work now going on leaves about \$200,000 in the valley each month, says the Jacksonville, Or., Sentinel.

The Spokane Falls City Council has passed an ordinance authorizing the lighting of the city with gas, allowing at the rate of \$38 a lamp.

Seattle, W. T., Union No. 45 Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, gave notice that on and after May 1, 1884, nine hours shall constitute a day's labor.

Says the Yakima Record: Hon. Geo. S. Taylor is the father of the first white child born in all Central Washington and he and Geo. Goodwin built the first buildings at Yakima.

The Railway Company will have to fill in twenty feet of water at Seattle for thirty tons of spikes. The wharf gave way on Sunday and part of the Starbuck's freight was pitched into the bay.

Seattle has enough land back of it under a high state of cultivation to supply a city of 300,000 population, and it costs not more than \$20 per acre to prepare it for the reception of the seed. This is what the Herald says about it.

A bequest of \$1000 has lately been made for the benefit of Grace Hospital of Seattle. The donor is Mrs. Louisa Scudder Vought, of Freehold, New Jersey, a former parishioner of Rev. Mr. Watson, the rector of Trinity Church.

G. C. Phinney informs the Seattle Post that he will, at the next meeting of the Council, propose to give to the city of Seattle his Lake Avenue Park, in the new Maynard Lake Washington addition. This park covers an area equivalent to that of eight full blocks, with streets between or about 800 feet wide by 1200 long, or nearly 25 acres.

Commenting on the climate in Western Washington, the Port Townsend Argus says: Men who go East from here pour their stories of a salubrious climate and mild winters into doubting ears, and new comers from the East are surprised to find a winter climate so mild here that roses bloom in January and birds may be heard from New Year to July.

Writing from Portland to his paper, Col. Frank Parker, of the Walla Walla Statesman, says: "To look around and see the really massive and magnificent buildings lately erected and in course of erection, I cannot see any real reason for growling. Portland is prosperous as never before, and to talk with the wholesale merchants and walk around the retail stores and see the luxury and splendor that surrounds one on every side, I ask myself if they know what they mean by 'hard times.'"

The country along the Cœur d'Alene river to the old Mission, a distance of 30 miles, says the Spokane Falls Review, is level and overflows in the spring; the bottoms are from two to three miles wide and the soil a black loam, very rich and would make the best meadows in the world, but this portion of the country is at present withheld from settlement as an Indian reservation. From the Mission to the mines the stream has more fall and the bottom somewhat narrower. The stream has a current of eight miles an hour and the bottoms are from a half to a mile in width and the most of them covered with heavy timber.
