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## THE ANTI-MONOPOLY CONFERENCE AT SALEM.

SALEM, OREGON, Feb. 6, 1884.

At an informal meeting of the anti-monopolists, held this day, at Salem, Oregon, to consider plans for organizing the Anti-Monopoly movement in the State of Oregon, Hon. M. Wilkins, of Lane county, was chosen chairman, and J. Gaston, of Washington county, was made secretary of the meeting.

After the object of the meeting had been stated by Hon. T. L. Davidson, of Marion county, letters were read from the Hon. Enoch Hoult, of Linn county, Dr. A. C. Kinney, of Clatsop county, Hon. Roscoe Knox, of Lane county, and others, approving and urging some plan of organization.

Addresses were made to the meeting by the Hon. T. L. Davidson, Judge Boise, Hon. F. F. Bonham, John P. Robertson, Esq., and E. O. Norton, Daniel Clark, Frank Cooper, Esq., of Marion county, Hon. G. B. Smith, of Benton county, Hon. D. M. Dunbar, and W. H. H. Myers, Esq., of Washington county, as to the propriety and plan of a State organization of the anti-monopoly element in politics.

On motion, a committee, consisting of Gaston and Dunbar of Washington county, and Boise and Bonham of Marion county, was appointed to draw up a statement of the principles of the Anti-Monopoly movement, and directed to report at the evening session of the Conference; after which action, the meeting took a recess for about three hours.

## RECESS.

Upon the reassembling of the Conference, the committee reported resolutions, which, after long discussion and amendments, were adopted unanimously, as follows:

1. Resolved, that the Law of the last session of the State Legislature known as the Mortgage Tax Law, is just, and assesses mortgaged property in the locality where it properly belongs; and that the assessment laws should be so amended as to prevent the making of temporary and fictitious indebtedness to offset assessed values.

2. Resolved, that all grants to Railroads in this State, unearned according to the contract, should be forfeited and restored to the public domain, for the use of actual settlers.

3. Resolved, that Congress and the Legislature of this State should enact laws to protect the people from the unjust discriminations and oppressive exactions now levied on them by Railroad Corporations.

4. Resolved, that whenever a person or corporation is doing business for or seriously affecting the general public, such business is subject to regulation by law.

5. Resolved, that it is the duty of the Legislature of this State to pass at its next session a Registry Law that shall guard the ballot box and prevent illegal voting.

6. Resolved, that the duty of the citizens to the public good is paramount to his duty to any public party, and that no caucus should bind any citizen or Legislator to vote against his conscientious judgment; and that the caucus system is now practiced in connection with the Legislature and the session of U. S. Senators is productive of fraud and bribery, and often defeats the wishes of the people.

7. Resolved, that it is not proper or safe to elect to Congress or the State Legislature the attorneys or servants of monopolies.

8. Resolved, that all tariffs and taxes should be limited to the needs of the government, State and national, economically administered.

9. Resolved, that we will not support any man for the Legislature, Governor, Supreme Judges or Congress who is not pledged and known to be reliably in favor of these principles.

ORGANIZATION.  
Resolved, that an Executive Committee of five be appointed, which shall be directed to issue an address to the voters of Oregon, embodying and supporting the above resolutions; and which shall invite correspondence from all friends of this movement throughout the State; and which shall have power to call a State convention of Anti-Monopolists whenever in the judgment of the committee such action is desirable and necessary to the success of the above principles; and which shall advise the Anti-Monopolists of the various counties that they must determine for themselves the propriety of either nominating separate tickets, or of supporting Anti-Monopolists on the Democratic or Republican tickets; and which shall cause to be issued an edition of fifteen thousand copies of *The Oregon Vindicator* containing the address of the Committee.

Messrs. Davidson, Bonham, Dunbar, Knox, and Gaston, were appointed as such executive committee; and Hon. T. L. Davidson, of Salem, Marion county, was chairman, to whom all letters, papers, and documents for the Committee, must be addressed.

Resolved, that all papers in the State friendly to this movement be requested to publish the above resolutions.

Resolved, that Wm. H. H. Myers, Esq. of Washington county, be chosen to represent Oregon in the National Anti-Monopoly Conference.

## PROHIBITION A FAILURE.

The *Levee* of Nov. 29th says: The state of Illinois provides by Statute, that there shall be no saloons within four miles of the Northwestern University, at Evanston, and so it is. Seven or eight villages within four miles of this institution, are free from drunken brawls, and of course trade, (liquor trade) is depressed.

At a late session of the Georgia Legislature, a law was passed allowing every county, on certain conditions, to vote—no license—and in case a majority vote, the government must proclaim prohibition in that county for two years, and by the way, that law was the result of efforts by the W. T. U. Some counties have already adopted prohibition by unheard of majorities. Clayton county, recently voted for prohibition, six to one.

Says the *Rescue* of Jan. 10, 1884: Thirty five counties in Georgia, have adopted prohibition, thirty six have partial prohibition, nine are soon to vote on the question and twenty five have voted against it. We shall watch for the results in Georgia, but there can be no doubt the law will be enforced and the results good. The manufacture and traffic in intoxicating liquor demoralize and reduce the labor of the country, by utterly unfitting its supporters for labor. Observation teaches that, just in proportion that men patronize saloons they waste their substance and their strength. The money that should go for the support of families or the education of children, is spent for liquor.

A gentleman in this state, who employs a number of hands, says that most of his men lose a large part, if not the whole of Monday on account of Sunday's debauch.

But Nat tells us, as these things have been told, over and over again, and figured down to a fraction, and they will continue to be told over and over, as long as the traffic is upheld by influential citizens and by law. But the good time coming, is drawing near. "Aid its tongue, and aid its pen; aid it, hopes of honest men." Nat thinks the attempt to eradicate intemperance by legislation, the silliest of all; silly or not, it is going to be done to a great extent. The liquor traffic is going to become disreputable and be driven to "holes and corners for a hiding place," and thousands of youths will be saved from the tempter's snare.

Just so long as it is sustained by law, just so long as the law says "for so much money paid into the treasury, you may entice young men to drink, gamble, and waste their time and money," just so long will men do all they can to win other men away from pleasant homes, away from the society and loving influences of mother, sister, wife, and children; just so long will men degrade their better natures and bring shame, ruin, sorrow and poverty upon themselves and families. The love of drink, the attractions of the saloon, whatever they may be, are stronger than the attractions of home and all the influences that loving friends can bring to bear. We must bring the strong arm of the law to our defence, and forbid the setting up of these snares to destroy our dear ones, and that is just what we are going to do pretty soon.

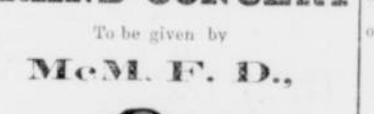
