Not a woman at the Cœur d'Alene mining district.

Snow drifts have stopped staging in Wasco county, Oregon.

Cœur d'Alene mining district is to have a newspaper in March.

Snow thirteen inches deep at Walla Walla. Crops safely assured.

The moving of the railway terminal to Phoenix has caused an exodus from Grant's Pass.

It is rumored that Dallas, Polk county, is to have a new paper. The *Heim* asserts that another "long felt want" is not needed there.

A change of 30 degrees in the aspect of the thermometer at the Dalles, during ten hours last week, made things lively—about the stoves.

Twenty-five to thirty men are availing themselves of the Coffee House, says the Walla Walla Journal. Sixteen slept at the public lodging room last night.

On Tuesday last the brewery of Messrs. Glaser & Kern, situated near Gervais, Or., was burned to the ground. The stock of barley, 1000 bushels, is among the losses, amounting to \$6000.

The snow was mostly gone when the cold came on, and farmers report that some fields of wheat are badly winter-killed, while others are little or not at all injured. In the timber the fields are protected by the snow which did not melt.—So says the Hillsboro, Or., Independent.

On Dairy creek on Monday last, says the Hillsboro Independent, A. Chalmers and Ira Inas killed a large panther, after it had killed eight of Mr. Chalmers' goats. It was treed by dogs and had climbed up a distance of nearly 90 feet, and the tree was clear of limbs most of the way. Who says now that a California lion will not climb?

Ducks are being slaughtered by the wholesale these days, says the Corvallis, Oregon Leader. So many of the ponds are frozen over that wherever there is a little water the ducks light on it by the hundred, and as the cunning hunter slips up on the unsuspecting fowls and fires into the flock he kills and cripples them by the score.

A bully game was played upon the family of Capt. Durham at Marshfield, Oregon, a few nights since. He heard burglars. He grasped a gun, his nephew an ax and a young lady a coal oil lamp quickly opened the door and found an enormous white bull, which was quietly scratching that part of his anatomy nearest the tail against the captain's door knob.

The Salem correspondent of the Albany Herald says: Our Congressman, M. C. George, is the subject of unceasing anathemas for his recent vote in the House against restoring the unearned lands of the N. P. R. R. Co., to the actual settlers. Your correspondent is of the opinion that Mr. George could not be elected constable in any precinct in the State outside of Portland.

At Colfax, W. T., George Haverley is in jail, and his opponent in a shooting scrape, Robert Devlin, is in a critical condition. It was a drunken row. On Tuesday morning Dr. Bowell told Devlin that his chances for recovery were very good, but there was a possibility of his dying, and if he had anything to say about his property to speak out then and not think of it again.

The steamship Umatilla is a 14 knot boat, and is comparatively new, being only two years out of the dock. Efforts will be made to raise her. The water now covers her upper decks, and only a few feet of her smoke-stack is now visible. There is considerable comment as to the wisdom of bringing her to an anchor with 14 feet of water in her, when she might probably have been beached and saved.

Says the LaCrosse, W. T. Mail-Secretary Lincoln has authorized Captain Powell to use the snag boat recently constructed by the Government for removing jams from the Skagit river, if the people of that locality will furnish the funds necessary to defray the expenses of the work until the Congressional appropriation is available. The people are asked to raise at least \$5000 to equip and man the boat.

A correspondent of the Boise Statesman, writing from Halley, Wood river county, says: Mr. W. H. Nye, who returned from the Wood river country yesterday, we learn that on Monday night the roof of the Halley theater fell in, making a total wreck of the building. The theater was being used as a skating rink, and a large number of people were engaged in skating and witnessing the exercises on Monday evening, who kept up the skating until some time past 11 o'clock. At midnight, after all had retired, the crash came.

Eighteen families from Illinois and Missouri landed in Sprague last Wednesday morning, says the Halley Herald. They are locating in Lincoln county. Let them come. We have lots of choice land left, and everybody is satisfied with the country. The new comers are pleased and greatly surprised to find such mild weather here, having come from regions where the thermometer has ranged from 20 to 40 degrees below zero. They appreciate our climate and all will recommend that their friends come here. We quote this as simply an instance of what occurs daily.
