The Dallas Sun says wild flowers are in bloom—yes, in Florida.

Dayton, W. T., is to have an educational journal, with F. M. McCully as editor.

Puyallup had an \$1800 fire recently, a dry house filled with lumber—no insurance.

According to the suffrage law of Washington Territory, women are not required to pay poll tax.

The Seattle Herald claims that 700 buildings were erected in that city during the last twelve months.

Walla Walla has forwarded that carload of provisions for the people of Indiana suffering by the flood.

John Shield, head sawyer at the Septon, W. T. mill, was pulled into a cog wheel and lost a few fingers.

So far, only 33 of the 46 Columbia river salmon canneries report ready for business or in preparation for the run this year.

The delayed mails reached this city to-day, being the first in ten days. 95 sacks came; the heaviest mail which ever arrived here. [Standard.]

A passenger on the stage from Port Moody to New Westminster, B. C., on Monday last got down from the stage, leaned against a tree and fell dead.

At Olympia, March 4th, C. B. Bagley passed in his business checks as proprietor of the Courier. Messrs. Dunham and Roberts are the new owners.

While digging a well at Helix, Eastern Oregon, last Saturday, Mr. R. W. Leopold was struck on the head by a crank of a windmill, and instantly killed.

Now that snow has gone from the canyons of Eastern Oregon, the people are looking up missing mail-riders and stage drivers. The Harney stage driver was the last found. He is being thawed out.

Writing of side crops, The Dallas Sun says: The basket willow is in many sections a very profitable side crop requiring little labor and often occupying land that would otherwise be of little value.

A petition is being circulated in Walla Walla, W. T., asking the Council to raise liquor licenses to \$3000 each per annum, and not to allow the issuing of such licenses for a less period than twelve months.

The Olympia Critic says: A ledge of iron ore has been discovered on a farm two miles southeast of Tacoma. The discovery was made while the party was digging a well. The specimens are pronounced good.

Workmen who were engaged in digging a well in the northern part of Seattle, says the Chronicle, ran into a lot of fir bark at a depth of eighteen feet. The piece alone remained, the tree which they encased having long ago mingled with the surrounding earth.

George Bennett, a longshoreman, accidentally shot himself on Monday morning. The ball entering the left breast near the thorax and came out at the top of the shoulder, fracturing the clavical bones. He walked six miles after the accident. There is little hopes of his recovery.

Says the Seattle Herald: It is said on what seems to be good authority that Mr. Villard will visit the Northwest in the beginning of next month. If he does, we are satisfied that the people of Seattle will give him perhaps not so magnificent, but certainly as warm and cordial a reception as they gave him last fall, when he was in the zenith of his glory and the center of an admiring crowd of guests.

Says the Tacoma News: Young Dave Wallace, now in the hospital with his left arm shot off, a long and ghastly wound in his breast, and a shot in his chin, cheek and eyebrows, is certainly a marvel of mental and physical "nerve." He is very much offended at the newspaper accounts of his accident. Instead of being conveyed into town on a hand car he walked in, a mile and three-quarters, crossing the trestle and climbing the hill without assistance.

The Spokane Falls Chronicle says: Quin-e-mo-se, an influential Chief of the Couer d'Alene Indians, this week perfected the title to his 1500 acres of land, located between this city and Fort Couer d'Alene. He was born on the land, and has made it his residence for the past seventy years, fully securing his land under the homestead act. A final proof of similar character probably never took place in the United States.

A correspondent of the Trinity Journal writes of the California and Oregon railroad that it will be one of the most crooked roads in existence. For the thirty-two miles already completed there is hardly a quarter of a mile of straight track, the road following the windings of the Sacramento river where possible and boring through the mountains where impossible. The road, when completed, will have one of the finest roadbeds in the world, mostly rock and everlasting.

Mr. J. C. Mays, who has been to his home ranch near Snake river, about forty miles west of here, says the Dayton, W. T. Chronicle, brings back the report of a wonderful cold well, which has been discovered in that vicinity. The parties who were seeking for water, dug down about forty-five feet through ordinary soil, when they were astonished to find frozen ground below them. They dug some five feet deeper, through the frozen ground, which was filled with cavities, from which the cold air came in gusts. Mr. Mays visited the wonder and says that persons at a distance of 25 feet from the well could hear the air roaring at the bottom. A bucket of water was let down and in a few moments it was frozen over. The cold is so intense at the bottom of the well, that work was abandoned and in consequence no water has yet been reached. It was left uncovered during the recent snow storm and the air came out with enough force as to prevent the snow from reaching the bottom. It is impossible for any one to hold their hand over any length of time without being frozen. This hole of the wonder country and is vouched for by Mr. Mays is a substantial and reliable fact at this county and his belief upon.
