

Quite the newest thing in the way of dress fabric will not be woven from the covering of any animal or the product of the silk worm, but from an apparently very unpromising substance-wood. Wooden gowns do not sound attractive, but the wood fiber when spun or otherwise prepared is a beautifully soft and lovely stuff, and scracely distinguishable from fine silk or the downy contents of the cotton pod.

A new form of intoxication is becoming common in New Jersey. A prominent Plainfield physician says that the paregoric jag is growing very popular with some of the first families of that burg. The doctor in question says the paregoric habit is more frequent than most people suppose. Paregoric contains, among other things, about forty-eight per cent. of alcohol, which is about the same proportion of alcohol that there is in whisky. Then it contains two per cent. of opium, so that the drinker gets the effect of both poisons at one dose and for about the same
