ARSENIC FOUND.—The body of Wm. Jones, buried in the Dundee cemetery, and concerning the cause of whose death there has been much suspicion, was exhumed early on the morning of November 24, by a party composed of M. J. McMahon, an attorney of Portland, Henry McGuire, non-in-law of the deceased, and James H. Fisk, a prominent chemist of Portland. They were accompanied by a half-dozen stalwart men with Winchester rifles, and a number of the heirs of the deceased. The exhumation was made by the light of lanterns about five o'clock in the morning, to enable the Portland parties to return home on the morning train. Mr. Fisk secured the stomach and contents, the heart, the liver and kidneys, and after a thorough examination has announced arsenic as present in sufficient quantity to produce death. A strong alkaloid was also found. The character of which the chemist has not fully determined. Whether the drug was self-administered or otherwise also remains to be determined. The investigation is being conducted at the expense of Mr. McGuire, who was charged with exhuming the body seventeen months after death, an account of which appeared at the time, and against whom graver charges have been preferred. He seems determined to sift the matter, and ascertain where the guilt lies. Attorney McMahon believes that if murder has been committed, the object was the old man's gold. The inventory of the estate as it now stands, he says, shows only \$629.46, while Jones, immediately before his death, is declared to have had from \$12,000 to \$14,000 in cash, and possibly more. Once it is established that there was murder committed, and there was a motive for such a crime, those interested say that they will find the guilty parties.
