SCHOOL REPORT.

Table with columns for Report of McMinnville public schools for month ending Nov. 9, 1894. Includes columns for Total, Boys, Girls, and various school metrics.

A comparison of the records of last year with that of the present is in every way encouraging, creditable to the teachers and board of directors. This is especially true in regard to days absent and cases of tardiness. For the month beginning October 16 and ending November 10, 1893, there was reported 715 days absence, and 102 cases of tardiness. For the same time this year the various teachers' reports show 187 days absence and but 16 cases of tardiness. Four rooms having but one case each of tardiness and one room having a clean record for the month. This makes a gain of 528 days attendance and a reduction of 56 cases of tardiness. These good results have been obtained by earnest, persistent effort upon the part of teachers, encouraged by parents and supported by an efficient board of directors. Co-operation of parents, teachers and school officers will secure even better results in the future. Teachers are bound by the rules to request of pupils excuses for absence from parents or guardians. These excuses should be promptly furnished as it is a wholesome means of discipline.
