He held that the certificate of membership proved on its face that it was issued on the general condition that the member should comply with the by-laws of the order; that the benefit assessment should be paid within 30 days from date of notice, and if not so paid the certificate would be null and void. The judge held that this constituted a

continuing liability and not a specific contract, except as the continuing liabilities were discharged at the time provided for in the conditions of the certificate and the by-laws; and that a failure to pay and thereby discharge the continuing liabilities as required by the laws of the order, forfeited all rights under such membership. He instructed the jury to find for the order and the verdict was


