1. Mrs. Clara Edwards of North Yamhill taken to the insane asylum by Sheriff Warren, her injuries being due to falling from a wagon.
2. A. H. Gaunt retired from the meat business, selling to R. W. Phillips, Jr. The new firm became Bond & Phillips.
3. 120 persons watched the new year in and the old year out at the Christian church. The passing of the old year was marked by tolling of the bell.
4. Mr. Martin succeeded Mr. Austin in the milk business.
5. Mr. Kierman sells the McMinnville Flouring mill to W. Kratz.
6. Geo. Belt of North Yamhill died.
7. E. B. Kelly negotiating with home talent to present a couple of dramas.
8. Fred Popejoy, aged 19, found dead in the barn of M. H. Messenger near Carlton, having killed himself by sending a bullet through his brain.
9. A Sons of Veterans organization was effected in 109 members. A. S. Cooper captain; B. C. Pearson 1st Lieut.; C. H. Hopfield 2d Lieut.
10. Miss Ethel Ballinger and Mr. M. L. Dorris of Independence were united in marriage.
11. People suffering with the grip.
12. Walker & Maurer open a new meat market.
13. M. D. L. Rhodes and J. G. Cleland represented the Jeffersonian club at a convention of democratic clubs at The Dalles.
14. Mrs. John Evenden left for California for the benefit of her health.
15. The Christian church of McMinnville preparing a card of general information to be displayed at the California midwinter fair. It was the sole effort of the kind at this point that culminated in actuality, and was not without good effect.

21. Mr. McCaskey, station agent at Carlton, buried by his fellow Masons with appropriate exercises.
22. O. H. Adams, confined to his home since Christmas by illness, was able to be on the street.
23. The Yamhill County Veterans Association organized with 33 members. C. A. Wallace chosen president, S. C. Pearson vice president. It decided to meet each year on Feb. 22, July 4th and Oct. 12th.
24. The county republican central committee met and appointed March 24th for primaries, and April 5th for convention. 149 delegates was fixed as the basis of representation.
25. The teachers held an institute at Dundee.
26. Col. Will L. Vischer gave a unique entertainment at the opera house.
27. Marriage of Mr. F. E. Griffith and Miss Ambia Wright.
28. S. Wilson took Harold, Perry and Ray Townsend to the state reform school.
29. L. E. Walker erecting a new meat market.
30. V. Levis and Marion Blair, lads of Amity, arraigned before Justice Rhodes for larceny of the store of Jeffries & Co., on night of Dec. 3rd.
31. Rev. Bonham resigned his pastorate of the Baptist church, to take effect March 31st.
32. Annual school meeting held. 100 voters present. R. Nelson reelected director. Clerk's report showed \$15,171.08 total receipts for year, and \$13,394.61 total disbursements. The total indebtedness was \$17,765.96, and number of legal voters 447. D. M. Caldwell was reelected clerk.
33. McMinnville college held an oratorical contest to determine who should represent the college at the state contest at Eugene. The honor fell to Mr. Lyman Latourrette.
34. W. F. Dudley and three companions arrive in McMinnville from Japan after a stormy voyage of 44 days on the ocean.
35. The McMinnville Grange discussed the opening of the creamery, and appointed committees to ascertain what support could be pledged.
36. About 35 populists met in Grange hall and reorganized. G. W. Olds was chosen chairman for the ensuing year and G. W. Seibert secretary.
37. Thos. J. Shadden, a pioneer of '42, died after a lingering illness, aged 85 years.
38. Frank S. Harding received word of his appointment as McMinnville's new postmaster.
39. "Only a Country Girl" presented by E. B. Kelly and his company to a \$90 house.
40. The firm of Wallace & Hartman, implement dealers, dissolved by mutual consent. Mr. Wallace continuing the business.
41. Seven Chinamen saved themselves from deportation by stepping up and registering. One fellow paid no attention to his registration.
42. The road improvement committee reported the expenditure of about \$1,800 on B street and the Amity road.
43. Lyman H. Cook and Otto Walling constructing a 40-ton boat which will navigate the Yamhill, to be known as the "Anetia."
44. The Anity Popgun suspended and the Oregon Blaine became the Phoenix of its class.
45. Mr. Harding sells his interest in the Telephone-Register to H. L. Heath.
46. Andrew J. Shuck, a pioneer of 1847, died, aged 78. He was appointed the first sheriff of Yamhill county, and in the legislature during six sessions. He left a widow and seven living children.
47. E. C. Casey, a resident of Happy Valley, died at the age of 60. He had lived in Yamhill county 16 years, was a native of Ireland, and left a wife and eight children to mourn his death.
48. Co. B, O. N. G. celebrate the expiration of their three-year term of enlistment by a supper at White's restaurant. The membership numbered 49, and during the term there were 97 enlistments.
49. Fifty-five teachers taking examination for certificates, thought to be the largest number in the history of the county.
50. Demorest silver medal contest won by Chas. Galloway, the first to be won by a boy in the county.
51. Mr. Anstine of Monmouth opened a furniture store during the current week.
52. Dr. Gouger badly hurt in a runaway away of his fiery steeds down Dayton lane, being thrown from his buggy upon his head. Recovery was speedy.
53. Peter Head adjudged insane; taken to the asylum by C. R. Cook.
54. The county Christian endeavor convention convened in Amity.
55. O. H. Adams celebrated his 76th birthday.
56. The firm of Colliard & Hunsaker, produce dealers, dissolved, Hunsaker continuing the business.
57. Circuit court convened with over 100 cases docketed.
58. Newt Rowland and Jas. Norris and families removed to Coos county.
59. Death of Wilson Peery of heart failure at Dayton, aged 68.
60. Harry Hill, confessed burglar of Chas. Grissen's store, taken to the penitentiary on a sentence of two years.
61. John Rhodes returned from an extended visit to Missouri.
62. Twenty members of Charity lodge No. 7 visit their brethren at Lafayette.
63. J. W. Martin sold his milk route to Robert Smith.
