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NEWS OF THE WEEK.

The Nebraska legislature has been asked by the town of Newport to pass resolutions favoring the deportation of Archbishop Satolli.

Senator Pritchard, who took his seat in the senate last week, is the first republican senator from North Carolina in the past 22 years.

The unemployed of San Francisco have decided to make a demand for \$2.50 per day when the state makes an appropriation to furnish work for their relief.

M. J. Clump, ex-treasurer of Clatsop county, Wash., was found short \$2500 in his accounts as he turned the office over to his successor. Clump has fled.

Kob, the populist, who contested for the governorship of Alabama and was left out, writes a message to the legislature urging the enactment of a law punishing usurpers, and signs himself governor.

The Colorado house has passed a bill raising the age of consent for girls from 16 to 21 years. It was introduced by Mrs. Holly, representative from Pueblo, who received much praise for her success.

Congressman Hermann has amended the sudden civil bill by providing for a lightship off the coast of Washington, and it is believed that it will meet with no objection if the amount is not increased in the senate.

The severest blizzard known for years was experienced throughout the west and northwest on the night of the 25th. From four to nine inches of snow fell and traffic was everywhere impeded. At Chicago the storm reached the strength of a gale.

Torrey, speaker of the Wyoming house, and Senator Woodruff caused a sensation by sending in their resignations as members of the legislature to the governor. Their action was brought about by some of their constituents sending a delegation to the capital to lobby for the bill appropriating funds for an agricultural college in Fremont county, after the members from Fremont—Torrey, Woodruff and Raney—had advised it would be unwise.

The San Francisco Chronicle has been sued for \$100,000 damages for alleged libel. The article with reference to the divorce of Dr. and Mrs. Hearne and to their antecedents and the present demand for damages is based on the allegation that the matter published was equivalent to a charge that Hearne had been a party to, or accessory to the murder of one A. J. Stillwell, the former husband of Mrs. Hearne at Hannibal, Mo., six years ago.

At Springfield, Mass., Robert Corgan, aged 13, while sucking an orange, swallowed a seed, which entered his windpipe. He was riding in a sleigh at the time, and finding himself choking, jumped out, and started to a store for aid. On his way he met two men, and managed to say, “Quick, quick, strike my back.” They thought him joking, and only laughed at him. A pained expression came on the boy's face, and before the men aided him he fell to the ground, unconscious, dying in a few seconds, in an office to which he had been removed.

The United States senate on Saturday sustained Cleveland's Hawaiian policy by a vote of 24 to 22. The resolution was offered by Mr. Vest, and was as follows: “Resolved, that while the people of the United States earnestly sympathize with the effort to establish republican institutions wherever that effort is made, they reaffirm the policy of non-interference unless by agreement with the affairs of other nations, and recognize to the fullest extent the right of every people to adopt and maintain their own form of government unaided and uninfluenced by foreign dictation. That the administration of President Cleveland in maintaining this policy as to our foreign relations deserves the approval and support of the American people.”

The bill pledging the faith of the United States to do the construction work of the Nicaragua canal passed the senate on the 25th ult., by a vote of 31 to 21. The bill, in brief, directs the issue of \$70,000,000 Nicaragua canal bonds. Each of these is to bear the following guarantee: “The United States of America guarantees to the lawful holder of this bond, full payment by the Maritime Canal Co. of Nicaragua, of the principal of said bonds and interest accruing thereon, and as it accrues.” An additional \$30,000,000 of bonds is to be issued without the United States guarantee. The total of \$100,000,000 thus issued is to be used in constructing the interoceanic canal. The secretary of the treasury is to have general supervision of the project. A board of fifteen directors is to have immediate charge of the work. The board is to designate ten members, no more than two of them from any one state. The United States is to receive \$70,000,000 of the canal company's stock in return for the guar-

antee of the bonds and is to hold a first mortgage lien on all property of the canal company.

The body of Lord Churchill was buried at Woodstock, England, on the 28th.

Pennsylvania is after the prize fighters. A number of arrests of pugilists was made on the 28th, due to a bout between Lewis and McKeever, and it is believed this action sounds the death knell of pugilism in that state. Fitzsimmons was arrested at Syracuse on the same day on a charge of manslaughter in causing the death of Riordan. He pleaded not guilty, and his case is continued on \$10,000 bail.

Eighteen adult negroes are in dire distress at San Francisco. They say they were induced to leave their homes near Keats, West Virginia, upon a promise of making seven dollars per day in employment on the Coos Bay, Roseburg and Oregon Navigation and Coal Co., and they earned only ninety cents a day, with a deduction for board furnished by the company. The miners of Coos Bay paid their way to that city.
