TWO YEARS.

Two years ago the democratic party took possession of all departments of the national government. It had captured the white house and both wings of the capitol.

Two years ago, that was March 4, 1893. But what a long, long time it seems, the dreary space between that day and this!

Partially rescued at last in spite of itself, this proud and puissant party next essayed the work of tariff reform. That was the thing for which it had been crying for many a year.

These are but three great, salient features of domestic maladministration. Abroad, the party, or its chief, at one point pursued a course that will forever be fittingly known as a "policy of infamy."

Never did a party assume more absolute power, with a clearer field before it, than did the democracy two years ago. Never was a party dismissed from public service in circumstances of greater ignominy and detestation than is the democracy to-day.

with a certain pig-headed rightness, the president has sought republican aid in checking the madness of the "wild horses" at the capitol. At another, the least had element of the democracy in congress has looked to the same source for aid in thwarting the white house "policy of infamy."

The concurrent action of the two houses of congress the United States will be represented in the proposed international monetary conference, and the delegates have been already chosen.

It is reasonable to expect that the six will be unanimous in their position on all important questions. They are all earnest advocates of genuine bimetalism without being committed to unconditional free coinage.

There is more ground to hope for practical results from this conference than from any preceding one. That there is something radically wrong with the monetary system of the great nations is now quite generally conceded.

The population of Portland as indicated by the school census is now given as 117,894, the east side having an excess of population over the west side, of 11,364.

The botanists of the state are watching with keen anxiety the blooming of the shrub popularly known as wild currant. Heretofore they were ready to assert that the flowers are pale red. Now a new candidate for recognition is to be studied—a white flower.

NEWS OF THE WEEK.

Bishop Thomas, Protestant Episcopal bishop of Kansas, died on the 7th. The woman suffrage bill passed the Maine house by a majority of 25 votes.

The California senate has passed a bill making the golden poppy the state flower. It is rumored that Lord Roseberry and Speaker Peel of the English parliament will resign, on account of ill health.

The marquis of Queensberry has been held to bail in the sum of \$7500 for libeling Oscar Wilde by writing a disgraceful epithet upon a card. Twelve thousand dollars has already been subscribed by the Chicago board of trade to be invested in wheat for the needy farmers of Nebraska and Kansas.

The Oklahoma house has passed a bill prohibiting the manufacture, sale or giving away of cigarettes or cigarette paper under a penalty of \$500 fine, one half of which is to go to the informant.

Ex-President Harrison has been ill with an acute attack of bronchitis, and much concern has been manifested for his recovery. He is improving but has aged rapidly in the past few months. That better times prevail in western Kansas is evidenced by the fact that 12 counties have notified Governor Morrill that they are in need of no further aid.

The Rev. Dr. Parkhurst, of New York, is coming to St. Louis for the purpose, it is announced, of engaging in the work of Sunday reform, in conjunction with Sam Jones and the local clergy. Attorneys have been retained to prosecute all violators of the statutes and ordinances, and the plans are complete for an active campaign against sin.

The noted trial of Harry Hayward for the murder of Miss Catharine King closed on Friday, and a verdict of guilty as charged was returned. According to the statutes of Minnesota only one fate awaits the criminal, that of hanging. Neither jury nor judge can alter the sentence.

Secretary Herbert has promptly taken up his program for the increase of the navy, provided for in a bill signed the last day of congress, and the machinery of the navy department for issuing designs and specifications has already been put in motion. Of the 11 vessels authorized the secretary determined that at least 9 shall be thus completed and commissioned during his present term of office, and that the other two shall be launched before March 4, 1897.

OREGON NEWS AND NOTES.

An apple tree in Salem was in blossom as early as the 9th inst. The wife of State Treasurer Metcaban died at Salem on the 5th. Workmen are flocking to Astoria in anticipation of the beginning of work on the railroad.

The date for the opening of the state fair will be September 25th, and it will last ten days. Members of the A. O. U. W. at Salem have sent a cash contribution of \$25.50 to their drought-stricken brethren in Nebraska.

Forest Grove will have the annual colt show of Washington county in June. Hillsboro will have a horse parade on April 6th. Judge Hewitt has refused to dissolve the injunction suit against the branch insular asylum, and an amended complaint has been filed.

Edgar Mayer, a sixteen-year-old boy employed by the Portland General Electric Co., came in contact with a live wire on Saturday, and was instantly killed. The schedule of rates made by the railroad commission last week gives Salem, Albany, Independence, Corvallis and some other points lower rates to Portland over the Southern Pacific.

Dr. Brown has resigned the pastorate of the First Presbyterian church of Portland after a service of six years to accept the secretaryship of the Presbyterian board of foreign missions. Ashland still leads the towns of southern Oregon in the number of school children, but Grant's Pass makes her look pretty close to her laurels, having 760 reported by the school clerk to 761 reported by the Ashland school clerk this year.

For the first time in four years the pumps at the station on Milwaukee and Powell streets, Portland, have ceased to run, and the old east side water plant is shut down. The cause of this was the turning of Bull Run water into the pipes, and now the east side, with the exception of Albina, has pure water from the city mountain stream.

WASHINGTON IS MOVING in the matter of state school books. The senate has passed a bill providing for the issue of a series of text books to consist of one speller, five readers, two arithmetics, two grammars, two physiologies, one history, the printing to be done by the lowest responsible bidder residing in the state, and the books to be furnished to all children at the actual cost of compiling, printing and publishing; the bill appropriated \$50,000 and passed, ayes 27, noes 4. In case the bill fails in the house, the senate also passed Pusey's bill authorizing the state board of education to contract for text books for the next five years with a stipulation that the prices must be 33 1/2 per cent less than the prices paid on the contract of 1891 for books of the same grade and quality.
