A COUPLE of New York clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal church recently set the whole country wondering and talking, by advocating Sunday opening of saloons in the interest of laboring men.

That there is nothing in the trade of the saloon keeper which should make it an exception to the long-settled policy of the state, which protects the right of rest and quiet worship on Sunday by forbidding ordinary traffic on that day.

Edison, the wizard, has gained control of the phonograph franchise and promises improvements which will astonish the public.

The London daily News speaking of the republican victory in Chicago gives credit to her own country as follows: "This clean sweeping of the most corrupt government in the world is ascribed to John Burns plain speaking and Mr. Stead's appeals, which touched patriotic pride or stirred the public conscience."

THE MONROE DOCTRINE.

The thickening complications in Central and South America, particularly the controversy between Great Britain and Venezuela, tend to revive interest in the Monroe doctrine.

"We owe it to candor and to the amicable relations existing between the United States and the allied powers to declare that we should consider any attempt on their part to extend their system to any portion of this hemisphere as dangerous to our peace and safety."

This declaration was made in consequence of the high-handed operations of the holy alliance in Europe, and the impending probability of an effort on its part to help Spain subdue her revolted colonies in South America.

When the Monroe doctrine is now spoken of, it implies a kind of standing antagonism to all efforts of foreign nations to secure or extend dominion on this hemisphere, or to obtain commercial or other advantages which may be detrimental to our interests.

There is a prevailing sentiment to the effect that European influence should be confined to Europe, and that this hemisphere should be left free to work out its own destiny in its own way.

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OREGON NEWS AND NOTES.

The new enumeration of the population of Corvallis will fall under 2,000.

Using the school census as a basis, the Chronicle figures that the city of The Dalles has a population of 6,000.

The sheep market in Oregon is looking up a little. The Dalles recently sent two trainloads of sheep to Chicago.

State Superintendent Irwin says Newport will be the place of the next state teachers' institute, probably in July or August.

About April 14th a Sunday paper, to be known as the Sunday Morning Record, is to be started at Independence by Gus H. Bynon, late of Salem.

The Oregon experiment station at Corvallis will give scaline, the new forage plant, a thorough trial.

Win. F. Beckman was sentenced to life imprisonment from Douglas county last week, for killing his wife and her son, Robert King, on the 10th of last September.

Benjamin Harrison, who has been dangerously ill, is now dangerously well—adapted from Lord Byron by several presidential candidates.—Portland Chronicle.

Another flying machine is reported nearly completed. It is reported to be in course of construction at Wells, Benton county, and its inventor to be David Vanderpool.

The county court of Benton county is being petitioned to cut off all allowances to county officials for deputy hire.

Daniel Reinmann and his little son aged 12, attempted to ford the Willamette four miles below Eugene, in a wagon.

The county court of Clackamas county, at a cost of less than \$100, has made the office of its county treasurer proof against robbery by hold-up.

Malcolm B. Bradley, who brought suit against Clackamas county for \$5,000 damages for the loss of his wife, who in a runaway was thrown down an embankment into the Clackamas river and drowned, was last week given a verdict for \$1,000.

Tuesday morning a carload of potatoes left Oregon City for Galveston, Texas. They were shipped by F. T. Barlow, the well-known merchant of this city.

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J. O. Hanthorn, one of the most prominent salmon packers on the Columbia, says that "the only salvation for the salmon industry is the scheme of artificial propagation."

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Attorney-General Idleman has decided that there is no vacancy in the commissions which the late legislature failed to elect, and they will keep their places.

NEWS OF THE WEEK.

An unconditional armistice has been declared by the emperor of Japan, thought to be due to the attack on Li Hung Chang. Troops, however, will not be withdrawn.

A snow and wind storm continued with great fury all day Saturday at Denver, being the worst storm there since 1854. Northwestern Nebraska also experienced the storm, while at Omaha the thermometer stood at 85.

The abstract of sanitary reports, as made by the surgeon-general, shows the presence of smallpox in 21 states of the Union. Of the cities, Milwaukee has suffered most this winter, recording 541 cases and 164 deaths.

Telegrams from points in western Kentucky and southern Indiana report that the forest fires are still raging, but definite information from any locality is lacking.

April 1st was the 80th anniversary of the birth of Prince Bismarck of Germany. Wonderful enthusiasm was displayed in its celebration by the Germans, and the prince was sent enough sausage and beer to provision a besieged garrison.

Sixty-four clerks, mostly women, on what is known as the bullion roll, have been discharged at Washington. They were appointed under the Sherman purchasing act and held that act was repealed, it was held, they could no longer be legally employed.

Drafts of proclamations opening to settlement the Siletz and other Indian reservations are in the hands of President Cleveland, and his formal proclamation is expected within a few days.

Early Saturday morning the north bound Oregon express on the Southern Pacific was held up near Marysville, Cal., and the result of the hold-up was the death of James J. Bogard, the well-known and efficient sheriff of Tehama county, who was a passenger on the train bound for home, and occupying a berth in the tourist sleeping car, and a robber, six feet high, weighing about 200 pounds.

The first intimation that the engineer and fireman had of the presence of robbers was when, at the place mentioned, one climbed over from the blind baggage and commanded, at the point of a pistol, that the train be stopped.

When a stop was made, they were commanded to move about 100 feet further, which they did. Then the robber caused them to jump from the train, and, with others who appeared to come from a hiding place in the roadway, made them request that the express car be opened.
