OREGON NEWS AND NOTES.

Insurance rates in Salem have recently been raised 20 per cent.

Scholl's Ferry has dropped the last part of its name, because there is no ferry there.

The new postoffice at Grand Ronde was named Butler in honor of Hon. N. L. Butler of Dallas.

Individual communion cups have been adopted by the Congregational church of Oregon City, the second church to make use of them on the Pacific coast.

The Roseburg Review, democratic, is already naming a successor to Hermann for the republicans. It says opposing candidates will be Col. Alley of Lane and Mr. Hofer of Marion.

A government surveying force has been sounding the river at Independence and ascertaining the altitude of the city above low water mark. They find it 31 feet, and only twice has the water reached the main street.

Through the effort of Gov. Lord, who "went after it," the soldiers' home at Roseburg has received an allowance from the national home of \$1,737.47.

A fruit grower at Milton employed several young ladies last year to pack strawberries. Merely for the joke some of them slipped in a number of boxes short, neatly-penned notes, and one was found by a Spokane musician.

The straw for fish stories has opened, and the Roseburg Review does not propose to take a back seat. It comes to the front with this statement: "D. P. Fisher caught five sturgeon in his nets a few nights ago, and has three of them tied up now to the river bank near town."

Silver Counterfeits.

The most serious danger threatening the country with a silver standard is the coinage of genuine silver coins by the counterfeiters. Silver is so cheap that nearly all silver coins have become mere tokens, and only retain their face value through the promise of governments to redeem them with gold.

The champion Oregon lie of the season comes from the Condon Globe. While the statement is not true, Oregon will probably come as near carrying out the conditions as any place in the world. It says: "It will surprise our Eastern readers, that D. C. Henry, whose excellent farm lies four miles south of Condon, is cutting wheat this week with a reaper. Mr. Henry did not get through cutting last fall when the threshing cut work, so he just left it till this spring. The grain is in just as good condition now as it was last fall and will yield just as much to the acre. This speaks volumes for our mild climate and fertility of soil. This is the choicest portion of the United States, and considering the large amount of vacant land out in this country, the population of the country ought to be ten times as great as it is at present."

A number of Portland citizens have banded together under the name of the Oregon Packing and Fertilizing Company, for the purpose of canning horse flesh and placing it on the markets of Europe in competition with the great American hog. Already 6,000 horses have been purchased, and Portland will have the first plant of this kind in the world. The great point which the promoters of this scheme had to solve was whether they could find a market for horseflesh canned, or dried and smoked. The hides, hair, oil and bones of the horses would about come to enough to pay for the animal and for slaughtering him, and if the meat could be sold there was a chance for some profit. It is well known that horsemeat is eaten in France and Germany by the poorer classes, but it is furnished to them in a fresh condition, and no one has tried to put it on their markets in a canned or dried condition. A great deal of trouble has been taken to find out what the prospects would be of selling horseflesh canned or dried. Of course it was impossible to find out to a certainty, without a practical test, but the parties interested have been so well convinced that the goods can be sold, that they have decided to make a practical test.
