AMERICANS consume about 344,000,000 pounds of tobacco annually, and according to the treasury statistics tobacco contributed \$28,617,898 to the revenues of the government last year.

It is alleged that Edison has invented a spring attachment for bicycles, whereby the surplus force of the wheel going down hill may be stored for use on an up-grade.

Governor Budd has promised the Manufacturers Association that he will appoint no one to the superintendency of state institutions who is not known to be partial to the use of California products.

ONE of our critical exchanges pays its compliments to Secretary of State Olney as follows: "Secretary Olney has been subjected to some criticism for using 'the United States' with a plural verb. If he does that, all we have to say is that he are an ass."

THE principal campaign in Ohio this year, so far as the democrats are concerned, is to secure a democratic legislature that will return Senator Brice to the United States senate.

It is said that James Clark, formerly one of the most noted members of the Quantrell and the Jesse James gang, who was killed the other day in Colorado, was an exceptionally gentle person in manners.

THE industrial exhibition will open in Portland Oct. 5th, following close in the wake of the state fair. It has been proposed, and quite likely the suggestion will be carried into effect, that the Yamhill exhibit at Salem be transferred to the exposition.

THE damage to the sheep industry in the United States by the democratic tariff law stands forth luminously in the following exhibit, which gives the official figures of wool production in the United States from 1890 to the present time:

Clip of 1890... 300,000,000 pounds. Clip of 1891... 307,000,000 pounds. Clip of 1892... 300,000,000 pounds. Clip of 1893... 284,000,000 pounds. Clip of 1894... 282,000,000 pounds. Clip of 1895... 264,000,000 pounds.

Under protection the domestic clip increased 64,000,000 pounds in three years. Under the threat and realization of democratic tariff tinkering it has decreased 100,000,000 pounds in two years.

While being hitched to his wood saw Monday morning, Mr. Frisbie's team was frightened by the opening of the safety valve. They ran with the neck yoke attached to the off horse, until they were stopped without damage in front of Johnson's blacksmith shop.

Capt Paul Webb, injured last 4th of July in the attempt to ride down a log chute in a barrel at Coner d'Alene lake, died at Spokane on August 29th. Capt. Stewart of this city, his father, was present when he died, and returned home Monday, after burying his son at Spokane.

OREGON NEWS AND NOTES.

D. E. Thomas, several years postmaster at Dufur, died on Sunday. A hundred Indians from the Siletz are picking hops in Polk county. Medford has voted to build a 10-room school house costing not more than \$14,000, to take the place of the one recently burned.

"The Pacific Empire," a Journal of Freedom," has been launched in Portland by Frances E. Gotschal, with Abigail Scott Duniway as editor.

Portland health officers are taking timely steps, in view of cholera having appeared in Honolulu, to have the city prepared for it in case the disease should reach there.

One Salem bank is said to have \$200,000 loaned on the season's hop crop. Even if that bank has had to turn "shark" itself in order to do so, it is doing well to protect its community against the foreign variety.

An Oregon City news item states that a party of about 12 Sunday hunters, of Portland, went through there on their way back from a shooting expedition up the valley. They had several hundred pheasants, a large number of which were very young birds.

McHarvey, a buyer of cattle in eastern Oregon, is back from Upper Burnt river, where he has purchased 700 head of twos, threes and cows. The price paid was \$16 for cows, \$18 for twos and \$26 for threes.

Residents of the Sublimity vicinity, in the eastern end of Marion county, report a rain storm of unusual severity in that section Friday evening. The hardest hail-storm within the memory of the oldest inhabitants occurred further east Saturday.

Four calceola sacks of dirt lying on the college farm, says the Corvallis Gazette, attract the attention of the pedestrian who goes out to the O. A. C. building. Each sack contains a sample of soil, one hundred pounds in weight, and is to be shipped to the department of agriculture at Washington, to be experimented with in order to ascertain what elements it comprises.

A 14-year-old daughter of Robert Dyer of Albina, committed suicide by taking rough on rats, Sunday. Early Sunday evening the girl asked her mother to let her attend service at another church with her Ellis, instead of going with her mother and sister to their own church, which she designated as "poky."

The county commissioners at their September term let the contract for covering the Pike, Fairchild, Mullenville and Trullinger bridges to Fairchild Bros. for \$325, the lowest bid. That of Deer creek let to John J. Purcell for \$79. Bills to the amount of \$1881 were allowed.

Official information of cholera in Honolulu was received in Washington on the 31st. Consul-General Miller of Honolulu, in a dispatch to the state department, says that cholera prevails at Honolulu, but is confined to the natives and Chinese. There have been about eight deaths. He adds: "There is no alarm, and every precaution is being taken."

A shock of earthquake was felt throughout portions of New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Delaware Sunday morning at about 6 o'clock. It was severest at Philadelphia, where according to telegraphic report the disturbance was violent enough, while it lasted, to create a good deal of consternation and not a little damage.
