An adverse majority of 75,000 against woman suffrage in Massachusetts does not discourage the champions of the cause, they declare.

All the five Central American republics are now banded together for an offensive and defensive alliance, consolidated diplomatic and consular service and inter-state free trade.

This is the third time that Wm. O. Bradley has run for governor on the republican ticket in Kentucky.

STATE censuses have been taken this year by Massachusetts, Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa and Minnesota, and the aggregate increase in population of these five states since 1890 is found to be 971,880.

Upon the face of the returns democratic papers will be able to figure out decreased republican majorities in some of the states, compared with a year ago.

A compromise has been effected in the Manitoba school controversy, by which parochial schools may be reopened, but must be supported entirely by Catholics, and those who patronize such schools will be exempt from taxation for the maintenance of the public school system.

We always enjoy paragraphs like this in the democratic press, the one below being from the Roseburg Review. Nothing stirs up the Tammany tiger like a religious republican meeting and the singing of the doxology.

The democratic party is greatly demoralized and discouraged by the result of last week's elections. It is true they did not expect to win many victories or carry many northern states, but looking back to the defeat of a year ago and trying to view it in the light of accident or temporary reverse, they hoped to regain something of the lost ground and discover new signs of hope for the future which should be a guiding star to rally their straggling forces for the greater contest of 1896.

SPAIN has been put to desperate extremities to raise money to carry on efforts to suppress the present Cuban rebellion. A moderate estimate places the expenses of Spain on this score at \$50,000,000 and the insurrection seems to be stronger now than it was when the first Spanish troops were sent to overcome it.

PROBABLY no one has hit nearer the facts about the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight than the St. Louis Star says: "It is probably true that Fitzsimmons does not want to fight. But it is equally true that Corbett did not want Fitzsimmons to fight and that the fellows who had agreed to put up the purse didn't want either Corbett or Fitzsimmons to fight, and there you are."

The statement was made by Miss Frances E. Willard, in her address before the Baltimore convention of the W. C. T. U., that "men who drink liquor drink less of it, and more men do not drink at all, than in any previous year."

Miss Willard's summary of the reasons for this proportional decrease in drinking is interesting. She says that "steam and electricity, machinery and invention, have put level heads at a premium. In the widening field of athletics, alcoholic stimulation is discontinued.

All of which is correct, and Miss Willard has placed the most potent agency first. Of all the factors promoting clear heads and strong brains in the present generation, those related to our industrial organization may be put foremost. We believe that there are not far from a million men in the employment of the railroad corporations in the United States, and a large portion of them hold places of responsibility, involving duties which can be performed only by men of steady sobriety.

But it is not the railroads alone which require sobriety and intelligence among employees. In the other great modern industries in which machinery is used, in factories, mills, foundries, printing offices, the building trades, electric works, water navigation, and many more, in all of which millions of men are engaged, sobriety on the part of all employees is essential to the conduct of business. The clerks and salesmen in the great stores of our cities must always be sober men. In every pursuit of our times, in all the professions, intemperance is a barrier to success.

It is by taking account of the method under which the chief industries have been organized within a generation, largely through the uses of mechanism, that we can best account for the lessening of the drinking habit. We do not overlook the influences of athletics or of bicycling, much less that of the moral agencies; but above any other influence, we reckon that of the new industrial forces and systems.

OREGON NEWS AND NOTES.

Ex-Governor Penneyer is spoken of as the next mayor of the city of Portland. The monthly report of Superintendent Paine, of the state insane asylum, shows that there are now 708 male and 318 female patients confined there.

A colony of people from Nebraska arrived in The Dalles a few days ago. There were forty-one families. The colony left Wood Lake, Cherry county, Neb., last Friday, and the first stop of any consequence made on the journey was at The Dalles.

The best paying black sand beach mine that has been discovered on this coast is near the Port Orford light-house. The claim when first discovered, nearly forty years ago, was yellow with gold for over twenty feet in width and three feet in depth, and paid \$200 a day to the man.

Richard J. Vincent, the boy who has nearly completed a trip around the world without a cent of money passed through the state last week. He started from New York two years ago and was then 13 years old.

A. C. Christensen of Albany is a rival of Sandow in strength says the Herald. He is not large, being about five feet nine, and weighing about 190 pounds, and has a ruddy complexion, indicating perfect health.

Mayor Sutro of San Francisco has joined the Salvation Army as an honorary member.

The 90th birthday anniversary of Elizabeth Cady Stanton, the pioneer of the movement for woman's rights, was celebrated in New York on the 15th, by the national council of women.

Senator John Sherman says: "The recent elections have cleared the political sky, and, I believe, fairly open a way for the nomination of Major McKinley. He will be heartily supported by the delegation from Ohio, and, I trust, will be nominated and elected."

Lord Dunraven charges fraud against the New York Yacht Club in connection with the recent Defender-Valkyrie races. Among other things Dunraven says the Defender was surreptitiously overhauled. He endeavors to throw the blame for the collision on the American boat.

On the 10th inst. at Chicago John D. Rockefeller was named a practical anarchist at a meeting of the Chicago socialist labor party, and the Chicago university was named the Chicago standard oil university. The application was made by Jesse Cox, a local attorney, in a speech, during the progress of the meeting held on West Twelfth street, in commemoration of the execution of Spies, Parsons and their comrades. Mr. Cox said there were two kinds of anarchists in this country. One was the kind that looked forward to the time when there would be no government, and when men would live together as brothers.
