

Hop buyers are beginning to move in Marion county. The Salem Statesman of Wednesday said, "The hop market is becoming a little stiffer and there is a strong demand for choice qualities at 13 @ 13 1/2 cents. It is also noticeable that the lower grades are beginning to move at about 11 cents, and that there is every indication that the English buyers are the only ones in the field at present. One sale of ninety-five bales, choice, was made recently in this city at 13 1/2 cents." According to the same authority nineteen hop contracts made between Marion county growers and the firms of Lillenthal & Co., of San Francisco, and Lillenthal Bros., of New York, were filed in the office of the county recorder on Tuesday. With the exception of one covering the crop of 1899, the hops thus disposed of are to be grown in 1898. The contract price in most instances was 8 cents, while in one case the crop of 1898 and 1899 were included at 10 cents.
